It was thought at Copenhagen that King Stanislaus was on board. Last Night his Danish Majesty made an unexpected Visit to this Town; he entered in his Coach by the Gate of Altona, with his Livery Servants walking before, and the Guard riding behind, as he is usually attended at Copenhagen: Having passed along the Ram-part as far as he could go, he turned down into the Streets, and so went back to Altona: The Cannon were fired at his Entrance, but that Compliment was omitted upon his own Desire when he left the Town.
