**L** E T T E R S from Copenhagen by the last Post advise, that the French Succours which landed without Opposition at the Wechſelmunde on the 11th, to the Number of 1500 Men, could not be admitted into that Fortrefs, the Governour declaring that he was then in a Condition of maintaining his Post, but should soon be obliged to surrender it for want of Provisions if he took in more Troops: The Sea Officers likewise refused to furnish what was necessary to subsist the Soldiers till such Time as they might hope to get into the Town; so that after one Day's Stay on Shore, the Troops were obliged to reimbarck and return to Copenhagen. On the 19th Count Plelo, the French Ambassadour, went on board, and resolved to go along with them himself to Dantzick; for which Place they set sail again the next Day with a fair Wind, accompanied by three Men of War, which lately came to join them. It was thought at Copenhagen that King Stanislaus was on board: We have several Reports of his having disappeared ever since the grand Attack of Haselberg, and some say he is dead. Last Night his Danish Majesty made an unexpected Visit to this Town; he entered in his Coach by the Gate of Altona, with his Livery Servants walking before, and the Guard riding behind, as he is usually attended at Copenhagen: Having passed along the Rampart as far as he could go, he turned down into the Streets, and so went back to Altona: The Cannon were fired at his Entrance, but that Compliment was omitted upon his own Desire when he left the Town. This Morning the Court set out for Oldenburg, being to dine at Blanckeneuse, and pass the River in the Afternoon. The Margrave is somewhat better, but not yet out of Danger.

*Hague, June 4, N.S.* Letters from Dantzick of the 25th of last Month advise, that the French Ships were come again into that Road from Copenhagen, to the Number of five Men of War and a Frigate, and that they had begun to land their Forces at Fort Wechſelmunde; but they make no Mention of what passed during the two Days Truce between that Town and Count Munich, though M. Brandt, the Prussian Minister, with their common Consent, had been there to confer with the Magistrates upon their present Situation.

According to Advices from the Rhine, the Hanoverian and Prussian Auxiliaries have joined Prince Eugene, who, it is thought, though much inferior to the French, will march very soon in order to dispute with them their carrying on the Siege of Philipsbourg.
