of June, 1734, PRESENT, 'The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

His Majesty in Council was this Day plea-fed to order the Right Honourable the Lord High Chancellor to iffue Writs for proroguing the Parliament which was appointed to meet on Thursday the 13th of this Instant to Tuesday the 16th Day of July next: And also for proroguing the Convocations of Canterbury and York, which were appointed to meet on Friday the 21st of this Instant, to Friday the 19th Day of the said Month of

Berlin, June 15, N. S. We have an Account by Letters from Konigsberg of the 8th Instant, that the Muscovite Fleet, con-fishing of 27 Men of War, great and small, with five or six Transports, arrived at Pillau on the 6th Instant, and that they were unlading their heavy Artillery, which, as the former, was to come through the Frisch-Haff to the Camp before Dantzick. Mell, Sulkowsky and Cetner, and Colonel Phul, with an Engineer and several Persons for the Service of the Artillery, passed through this Town on the 11th Instant in their Way from Dresden to the Muscovite Camp before Dantzick; and fince then some of the Domesticks of the Elector of Saxony having followed them, it is supposed that Prince designs also to be there soon in Person. Letters from the Russian Camp, which are just come in, bring Advice, that the Russian Fleet was arrived in the Road of Dantzick, and that the heavy Artillery was expected every Moment from Pillau. These Letters add, that M. Tarlo, and other Polish Chiess, had assembled a very considerable Body together, and were come into the Neighbourhood of Dantzick.

Hambourg, June 18, N. S. Their Danish Majesties set out Yesterday Morning from Altona, and were saluted by a general Discharge of the Cannon from the Ramparts of this City. Their Majesties will not remain above Four or Five Days at Eleswig, and then pro-

ceed on their Return to Copenhagen.

Hague, June 22, N. S. The States of Holland separated on Saturday last. They resolved ved, before their Adjournment, that her Royal Highness the Princess of Orange should be received with the same Honours as were done to her present Britannick Majesty, when Princess of Wales, in her passing through this Place for England. According to Advices from the Rhine, the Imperial Army was on the 16th at Hailbron, having then laid several Bridges over the Necker, in order to their palling the same, and marching towards the French Army. Advices from Dantzick mention the Arrival of the Muscovite Fleet Before that Place, having first landed at Pillau
