THE following Address having been transmitted to Samuel Holden, Esq; has by him been presented to his Majesty, being introduced by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State: Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To his most Excellent Majesty King George the Second.

The humble Address of his Majesty's loyal and dutiful Subjects, the Ministers of Christ and Pastors of the Churches in his Majesty's Province of the Massachusetts Bay in New-England, at their Convention in Boston, May the 29th, 1734.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

THE Fame of the happy Nuptials of the Princess Royal of Great Britain with his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange, together with the universal Joy of the Nation, testified in their Addresses to the Throne on this Occasion; as also the very gracious Acceptance which the Addresses of the Protestant Dissenting Ministers, our united Brethren, have found with your Majesty, with your Royal Consort the Queen, and with their Serene Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Orange, encourages us also in these distant Parts of your Majesty's Dominions, to make the most early Representation we can, of our Share in the common Joys of the Royal Family, and of all your faithful Subjects in every Part of the British Empire. It gives us a most pleasing Remembrance of the inexpressible Joy of our Fathers, in the Day of the Nation's Deliverance from Popery and Slavery, by the ever glorious Prince of Orange, afterwards our rightful and gracious Sovereign, King William the Third; which was never equalled among us, but only in the Day of the Accession of your Majesty's most Illustrious Protestant House to the Throne over us, and now in the numerous Progeny of Princes, with which it has pleased God to bless your Majesty and your Dominions, and that we see the Princess Royal wedded to another Prince of Orange.

That the most Serene House of Nassau may for ever shine in the Persons and Posterity of their present Highnesses, as it has always done in their glorious Ancestors, from the first Reformation from Popery; and that the Life of your Majesty and the Queen may be prolonged to see the Childrens Children of this, and other like happy Marriages of all the Royal Issue, to Protestant Princes, to the equal Joy of all your Dominions, is our ardent Prayer, and our pleasing Hope.

We also beseech your Majesty to permit us to lay at your Royal Feet, our humble Ac-

knowledgements of the many Blessings which your Majesty's Subjects of this Province enjoy under your auspicious Reign; and in a very particular Manner we crave Leave to mention this one distinguishing Act of the Royal Favour and Grace to us, that it has pleased your Majesty to fill the reserved Posts of Government, with Gentlemen the Sons of the Province, who have at Heart all the Rights of your Majesty's Honour, and those also of your happy Subjects here, both Religious and Civil: This, if it were possible, would add to our sacred Bonds, and fervent Inclinations, ever to approve ourselves,

May it please your Majesty,

Berlin, July 20, N. S. King Stanislaus has for certain left Marienwerder, but it is not known here whether he is gone. We hear from Dresden, that the Elector of Saxony set out from thence on the 15th on his Journey to Dantzick, where he was expected as this Evening. The Marquess de Moriti is still closely confined in the Muscovite Camp, and some pretend to know here, that he is to be sent to Petersbourg.

Paris, July 28, N. S. Last Night between Eleven and Twelve a-Clock, her most Christian Majesty was happily delivered of a Princess. By Letters of the 23d from our Army upon the Rhine, we learn, that Prince Eugene decamped in the Night between the 21st and 22d, and was marching towards Heidelberg, and that his Quarters were to be that Night (the 23d) at Kirlock. The Germans in Italy begin to move out of their Quarters at Rovere, and several Bodies are come up to their Side of the Secchia; which may perhaps make the Siege of Mirandola more difficult to the Allies, and occasion some Action.

to be Men, with their Faces blacked, who beat him till they thought he was dead, then robbed him of Fifteen Guineas and Two Shillings; since which the said Jeremiah Brusford has had a Stack of Hay set on Fire, and an Ox wounded: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in such heinous Crimes, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
