Copenhagen, July 31, N. S.

N the 29th the King of Denmark, attended only by the Grand Mar-shal, came to Town, and saw a new Frigate of 18 Guns launched; after which his Majesty passed into the isle of Amack, and reviewed the four Companies of Artillery; besides the usual Exercise, they threw some Bombs, and shot at a Mark with Cannon; but the Gunners not succeeding very well in this Performance for Want of Practice, they are for the future to have a larger Allowance of Powder, and to exercise oftner, in order to grow more expert. When all was over, his Majesty dined in private at Rosenburg, and then returned to Kirscholm.

Hague, Aug. 6, N. S. The last Advices from Italy are, that the Imperial Army being encamped at Rovere, Field Marshal Count Koniglegg arrived there on the 11th of July N. S. and took on him the Command in Chief, which Prince Lewis of Wirtemberg had had from the Death of Count Merci. Count Koniglegg reviewed the Troops on the 12th and gave Order for carrying to Mantua such Ammunition and Artillery as might be spared, and also the heavy Baggage. On the On the 14th he went, with several General Officers, to view the Ground at Quingentolo, and having pitched upon that as a more healthful Camp for the Troops, and more advantageous by its Situation, he caused the whole Army to march on the 19th from the Camp of Rovere to that of Quingentolo, the Right extending to the Po, about a Mile from the Place where the Secchia falls into it. By the present Encampment of the Imperialists, the Town of Mirandola is covered from the Siege with which it was threatned by the Allies; and by two Bridges over the Po, they keep open a Communication with the Mantuan, from whence they are chiefly supplied with Provisions. The Army of the Allies was encamped on the other Side of the Sec-The Duke of Modena having Advice that some Troops of the Allies had entered Reggio and Rubiera, and that they were preparing to advance to Modena, quitted it the 16th of July, and retired with his Familia to Bottom. preparing to advance to Modena, quitted it the 16th of July, and retired with his Family to Bologna, there to reside. Letters from the Upper Rhine of the 31st of July relate, that Prince Eugene, with the Army he commands, had decamped from Bruchsal, and was marching towards Heidelberg. from Dantzick of the 27th past advice, that the Elector of Saxony being arrived there, a Deputation of Thirteen Persons of that City had Audience of him the 26th, and acknowledged him King of Poland. Several of the Polish Nobility, who upon the Surrender of Dantzick had acknowledged him, were also admitted to kiss his Hand. King Stanislaus continued in the Pruffian Territories. The Grand Pensionary is pretty well again, and the States of Holland are summoned for Wednesday next. The Marquess de Fenelon has made a Visit to Count Golusskin, on Occa-sion of the Detention of the Marquess de Monti, and the Three French Regiments convey'd to Croonstad, alledging it to be contrary to the Law of Nations; and therefore he defired the faid Count Golofskin's good Ofces in representing the Matter to his Court; and has even intreated the States in his Master's Name to interpose likewise their good Offices; who accordingly fent their Deputies Yesterday to Count Goloskin on that Subject.
