War faw, Nov. 4. He King lies still encamped near Lublin, and hath declared his intentions are to break up very suddainly from thence, and to dismils the Nobility, who are indeed hardly able any longer to keep the Field, by reason of the approaching winter, and the great scarcity of all kind of Provisions for their subsistance; and at the same time the King resolves to go for Lythuania, to hold a Convention of the Nobility of that Dutchy, to induce them to enter into the Confederation for the support of the Regal Authority, and the defence of the Kingdom; the Nobility of Poland have solemuly sworn the said Confederation; the form of their Oath is as follows.

N. N sofmy own free will, and without any constraint, swear by the Holy and blessed Trinity, That for the Honor of Gods the dignity and welfare of our free Elested and Growned King, and Lord, and the prefervation of this Republich, and the Priwiledges and Liberty thereof against all enemies whatsever, I will readily expose my Life and For-tunes, and that I will not forsake or depart from this Confederation, till our Countrey be freed from all danger of any enemies as well at home as abroad, but will do all that shall lie in my power for the ma-king this Treaty more strong and wall, until we shall have obtained the ends aforesaid; and if I come to know that any person does act in prejudice of this Confederation and Brotherly Agreement, I shall be obliged to discover the same, without having the least respect to Friendship or Relation, and account and projecute him as an open Enemy; I have not ta-ken any Money to be corrupted, nor will I take any; I will not hold any intelligence, or act on any occason to the prejudice of my King and Countrey, but will truly and fincerely observe this Confederation in brotherly unity, without any mental reservation, or bope to be dispensed therefrom, so help me God.

We are now certainly told, that by the Treaty concluded with the Grand Signior, this Crown is amongst other things, obliged to pay annually 22000 Ducats to the Port 3 the first payment whereof is to be on the s of this month, and to to be made yearly on the same day; for which the Grand Signior engages to secure this Crown against all inroads and incursions of the Tartars, or at least to procure satisfaction for such depredations the said Tartars shall at any time hereafter commit upon the Polish

Subjects Aleppo, fut, 8. By the fait Lettem from Zuratte, we have advice, that Monfieur de la Maye was arrived there with 10 French men of War under his Command, and was departed thence again for Gas; to forn with the Bortugueles, and is was said to act joyntly with them agginit the Duigh.

Ratisbonne, Nov. 8. This evening is expected here the Imperial Commillioner, the Archbishop of Aichstadt, whose presence seems at present very necessary for the dispatching of leveral publick affairs. Prince of Baden Dourlach, together with the other chief Commanders of the Forces of the Empire are suddainly expected here.

The 6 inftant arrived here the Sieut de Gravelle,

from the Elector of Bavarla's Court, whither he had been lately dispatched by Monsieur, Vitry, Extraordinary Envoy from France. The news here is, that the confederate Armies are marching down the Rhyne towards, Coblent and Gologne, and that on the other fide, the French Army makes at much hast to meet them; what the issue hereof may be, we expect with much impatience. Count Montecuculi is returning for Vienna, and leaves the Command of

the Army to the Duke of Bournonville.

Heydlebergh, Novemb. 72. This week his Electoral Highness removed hence with the whole Court to Manheym, with intentions to go and pals some time at his Castle of Fredericksburgh, where arrived some days since Prince George, Brother to the present King of Danemark. The Prince of Conde hath sent hither the Master of his Horse, to acquaint his Electoral Highness with his arrival at Merz, and that he was bringing together a considerable Force by order of his most Christian Majesty. This week several Deputies were here in Town from the Princess Dowager of Simmeren, the Marchioness of Badea Dourlach, and from the Cities of Worms and Heyl-bron, to confer with his Electoral Highnels concerning the present Conjuncture. We have advice here, of another Rencounter that some days since happened between a party of 300 Brandenburghs, and a party of French, though without any other particu-

Vienna, Nov. 12. General Cops continues still with the Forces under his Command in Hungary, in order to the restoring that Kingdom to a perfect peace and quietness again. They of Esperies, notwith-standing the deseat of the Rebels, and the little reas fon they have to hope they shall be able to hold out long, have refused to surrender the place to the Imperralifts though upon promise of pardon, decla-ring they would not so easily part with their liberty, which was dearer to them then their lives, or what elfethey had besides; and we are farther told, that fome of the Emperors Forces having passed by the place, they fired very briskly from their walls upon them, and were about making a Sally, but that they were discoutaged by the greater force of the Imperialists. Abaff Prince of Transstvania leems not to take much notice of the message sent to him by General Cops, to deliver all the fugitive Rebels into his hands, and as it is faid, declares, that as he will not give them any particular countenance or prorection, to he cannot refuse them the liberty of passing, as they think sit into his Countrey.

Luxembergh, Nov. 13. From Metz we are told, that the Prince of Conde was bringing with all diligence an Army on foot in those parts, which it was nor doubted but he would be fuddainly able to effect. All the Troops had been already drawn (except the Garrison that was thought fit to be left there,) out of Nancy and the other places of that Countrey; and it is faid, that at present the Prince

has with him about 8000 Men.
