The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to order, that the Parliament which stands prorogued to Tuesday the Thirteenth of this Instant August, should be further prorogued to Thursday the Twenty sixth Day of September next. And that the Convocations of the Provinces of Canterbury and York, which stand prorogued to Friday the Sixteenth of this Instant August, should be further prorogued to Friday the Twenty seventh Day of the said Month of September.

*Berlin, Aug. 10, N. S.* The Elector of Saxony arrived at Dresden the 3d Instant from Dantzick. The Demand of 800,000 Crowns made by the said Prince towards the Expences of the War, is fallen to between 2 and 300,000, which the Dantzickers are to offer by Way of a Free Gift, and as an Instance of their Duty and good Affection. It is here reported that the Marquês de Monti is set at Liberty. The Accounts we have out of Poland are very confused; in general, however, they agree, that the Party of King Stanislaus is still numerous and strong. We have just now received Advice, that the Primate is ready to make his Submission to the Elector of Saxony as King of Poland.

*Hague, Aug. 17, N. S.* The King of Prussia was expected as Yesterday at Cleves, whither M. Lujsius his Resident is gone to meet his Majesty by his Order; but his Majesty's Journey hither is now become very uncertain. The States of Holland who separated last Saturday, returned hither last Night in order to resume their Assemblies. His Britannick Majesty's Ministers, and the French and Muscovite Ambassadors, were all Yesterday in Conference with the States Deputies. The last Advices of the 10th Instant from the Imperial Army on the Rhine give an Account, that Prince Eugene had pass'd the Necker, and was marching towards Mentz, in order to pass the Rhine; two Bridges were already prepared for that Purpose. Letters from Franckfort of the 12th Instant advice, that the French, upon Prince Eugene's Motion, had left their Camp near Mentz, and were drawing back towards Spire.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the better Government of the Charity for Relief of poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy; These are to give Notice to all such Widows as aforesaid, whose Husbands died on or since the 30th of August, 1732, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth, and also with the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford and Woolwich, and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where they may be informed of all Particulars which entitle such Widows to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose: But such Widows as live at too great Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Thomas Corbett, Esq, at this Office, who will send them all necessary Information.
