Vienna, August 11, N. S.

AN Expres arrived Yesterday Morning from Italy, by which it is said this Court has received Advice that the French are preparing for the Siege of Mirandola, and that Marshal Koniglegg is resolved to hinder them if possible from attacking that Place. The King of Portugal's Brother, who has been many Years here, sets out with his Portugese Majesty's Permission, this Day for Lisbon by the Way of Lyons and Bayone, and is accompanied by the famous Capuchin Father Augustin.

Berlin, Aug. 17, N. S. We have now certain Advice that King Stanislaus has fixed his Residence at Angersburg in Brandenburg Prussia; in which Place there is a small Castle with a Garrison, which has been augmented for that Prince's greater Security.

Hague, Aug. 20, N. S. According to the last Advices from the Rhine, the French Army had marched behind Spirebach; and Prince Eugene, instead of passing the Rhine, was returned towards Heidelberg to observe the Motions of the French.

Hague, Aug. 24, N. S. The States of Holland separated last Week, to meet again, as usual, in September, if not summoned before. The King of Prussia is at Wesel, but there is no more Talk of his Majesty's coming to Holland. By the last Letters from the Rhine we have Advice, that a French Detachment, under the Command of the Duke de Noailles, had passed the Rhine at Phillipsbourg, and was encamped at Bruchsal; and that it was thought their Design was to go and possess themselves of the advantageous Camp of Hailbron; whereupon Prince Eugene had sent a Detachment under the Command of Prince George of Hesse to prevent it.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the better Government of the Charity for Relief of poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy; They are to give Notice to all such Widows as aforesaid, whose Husbands died on or since the 30th of August, 1732, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth, and also with the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford and Woolwich, and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where they may be informed of all Particulars which entitle such Widows to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose: But such Widows as live at so great Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Thomas Corbett, Esq; at this Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And there being Ground to hope, that the Governors of the said Charity may be impowered to distribute some Relief to the Widows of such Sea Officers who died before the 30th of August, 1732, provided their Circumstances come within the Rules thereof; these are to give Notice to all such Widows to repair or send to the above-named Places, that they may be provided with the proper Certificates accordingly. And the Court of Assistants do hereby give Notice, that they shall meet at this Office on Tuesday the Tenth of September, at Eight of the Clock in the Morning, to receive and adjust the Claims of all such Widows as shall be qualified according to the said Rules and Orders.

A General Quarterly Court of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, for the Augmentation of the Maintenance of the Poor Clergy, will be held at the late Archbishop Tenison's Library, near the Meuse, in the Parish of St. Martin in the Fields, on Monday the 2d Day of September, at Ten of the Clock in the Forenoon.
