Dantzick, August 28.

THE Saxon Troops have all left the Territory belonging to this City, except Four or Five Hundred Men which still remain in the Fort of Wechfelmunde; the greatest Part of the Russian Troops have likewise put themselves on the March: Some remain till the Sum stipulated by the Capitulation be paid by the City. On the 25th Instant Six Deputies from this City set out for Petersbourg.

Heidelberg, Aug. 31, N. S. The Imperial Army commanded by Prince Eugene, is encamped with the Right extended to Eppelheim, and the Left near to this City, where the Head Quarters are; but it is thought they cannot subsist long where they are for Want of Provisions, and especially of Forage, the whole Country having been foraged by the two Armies for above 15 Leagues round. We suffer extremely in this City by the Scarcity and Dearnels of Victuals of all Sorts; all the Vineyards in our Neighbourhood are destroyed by the passing to and fro of the Armies. The French intrench themselves in their chief Camp at Raftadt, but have several Bodies of Troops quartered in other Parts of the Country.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the better Government of the Charity for Relief of poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy; These are to give Notice to all such Widows as aforesaid, whose Husbands died on or since the 30th of August, 1732, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth, and also with the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford and Woolwich, and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where they may be informed of all Particulars which entitle such Widows to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose: But such Widows as live at too great Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Thomas Corbett, Esq; at this Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And there being Ground to hope, that the Governors of the said Charity may be empowered to distribute some Relief
