BY Letters from Naples of the 3d Instant we have Advice, that the Duke de Bitonto landed on the 29th of last Month, with Part of the Troops that were on board the Fleet, between Termini and Palermo, where he met with the greatest Part of the Nobility; and the Senate of the said City were assembling to go and meet the said Duke, their new Viceroy: that the Imperial General, who was in the Neighbourhood of that City with some Troops of Hussars, retired to Siracusa at the Sight of the Spanish Fleet; that the other Body of the Troops was landed at the Tower of Faro, near Messina, and the Commander of the Tower was retired with the Garrison to Messina; and that the said City of Messina was preparing to receive the Spaniards.
