*Petersbourg, August 31, O. S.*

A Courier is arrived here with the News, that General Ismoyloff, with the Russian Troops under his Command near Grodno, had attacked and entirely routed Six or Seven Thousand Poles, which were commanded the Day before the Battle by the Regimentary of Lithuania Potczie, who thought proper to leave the Command of his Army to the Cupbearer of Lithuania, not caring to hazard his own Person in the Action. About a Thousand Poles were killed on the Spot, and General Ismoyloff has taken all their Tents, Baggage, and their Train of Artillery of thirteen Pieces of Cannon.

*Copenhagen, Sept. 18, N. S.* M. Brackel, her Czarish Majesty's Minister, upon the Importunity of M. de la Noue, and the French Officers, has consented to receive the Russian Frigate from them here, and has committed the Care of it to one Creutz, a Captain in the Danish Service, who has, by his Excellency's Intercession, obtained Leave to conduct it to Petersbourg: For these two

Days past this Frigate has born the Russian Flag, and lies ready to pursue its Voyage with the first fair Wind. Count Frize, who had a Permission to quit the Service upon the Rhine, is come hither by the King's Order, probably to give his Majesty a full Account of the Condition of the Army there. Count Holst, his half Brother, Son to the great Chancellor, succeeds him in his Regiment of Horse, as M. Ampthor does in the Command of the Cavalry under M. Morner.

*Hague, Oct. 1, N. S.* Our Letters from the Upper Rhine of the 24th past advise, that the French Army, commanded by the Marshal d'Asfeld, was encamped in the Plain of Weil, between Kentzingen and Eendingen, within two Leagues of Old Brisac; but it was not believed they designed to besiege that Place. The Imperial Army, commanded by Prince Eugene, continued in the same Posts, but 16 Battallions had been detached, and were on the March for Italy, under the Command of the Count de la Lippe.
