The next Day the Duke de Bitonto marched to Mala Spina, where he was met by a great Number of the Nobility and People; and on the 2d Inftant in the Evening he made his publick Entry into Pa-lermo, accompanied by all the Officers of the Army, was received at the Door of the Cathedral by the Archbifhop and the Chap-retire into the Citadel.
