

tacked the French near Guastalla the 19th past, and that after a sharp Engagement which lasted between Six and Seven Hours, he retired in good Order to Luzara; that he had ordered a Bridge to be laid over the Po at Borgoforte, and had sent for 4 or 5000 Croats, and the greatest Part of the Garrison of Mantua, to repair to him, intending after those Troops had joined him to attack the French again, which he believed he should be able to effect on the 23d.

Hague, Oct. 8, N. S. We have as yet received no particular Account on the Part of the Imperialists of the Battle fought at Guastalla on the 19th past. Yesterday Count d'Uhlfeld received a Letter from Mantua, dated the 24th of September, advising, that the Imperial Army, commanded by Count Konigsegg, was then at Montegiana near Borgoforte, whither they had brought up their Bridges, and had received a Reinforcement of 6000 Men, Croats, or other Troops. The French continued in their Camp at Guastalla. It was expected there would soon be another Action. It is advised from the Rhine, that Prince Eugene set out for Vienna the 2d Instant, having left the Command of the Imperial Army, encamped at Heidelberg, to the Duke of Wirtemberg. Letters from Paris relate, that the Marshal d'Asfeld, with the French Army, continued encamped near Offenbourg, from whence the Count de Clermont, the Prince de Conty, the Prince de Dombes, and the Count d'Eu, were returned to Versailles. Next Wednesday is appointed for the States of Holland to assemble here.
