*Petersbourg, September 14, O. S.*

**T**HE Six Dantzick Deputies arrived here the 6th Instant, but have not yet had their Audience of her Czarish Majesty. They have applied to his Britannick Majesty's Minister, and other Foreign Ministers, to use their good Offices in endeavouring to procure some Abatement of the Sum agreed upon by the Capitulation. Five Russian Men of War and two Frigates, commanded by Vice-Admiral Snaren, are sail'd from Cronstadt for Revel, where they are to winter, to be in Readiness to put to Sea early in the Spring, in Case of Need. M. de Lestang, whom the French Court has sent hither with a particular Commission, has had an Audience of the Czarina.

*Milan, Sept. 25, N. S.* On the 22d Te Deum was sung here for the Victory obtained by the Allies over the Imperialists the 19th. Six Thousand Recruits are arrived in this Dutchy for the French Troops. A few Days ago a Grand Council was held here to deliberate upon Means for raising the necessary Money, in order to pay regularly the Duty called the Diaria.

*Mantua, Sept. 29, N. S.* Count Konigsegg passed the Po the 26th Instant near Borgoforte, and encamped in the Seraglio. We have Advice that the Army of the Allies has likewise passed that River near Guastalla, to oppose any Enterprize of the Imperialists on the Side of the Oglio: These last have been joined by the Croations and a Party of this Garrison, who set out four Days ago: They have likewise received 2000 Recruits, and expect as many more, who are already arrived in the Tyrolse; and it is assured that some Imperial Regiments are on the March hither from the Austrian Countries. Count Konigsegg seems to have

a Design of continuing the Campaign during the whole Winter. The Imperialists are still in Possession of Mirandola, Quistello, and Rovere. General Valparaiso, and Major Spiltz, Knight of the Teutonick Order, died the 27th of their Wounds, received in the Battle at Guastalla.

*Vienna, Oct. 2, N. S.* The Court has settled all the necessary Means for putting Count Konigsegg in a Condition to continue the Operations of the Campaign during the Winter in Italy. Orders have been sent to the Austrian Dominions, to furnish in a certain limited Time 2233 Recruits, which are said to be destin'd for Italy; and it is also assured, that the Court has lately concluded a Treaty with several Princes of the Empire for Troops, which are likewise to be sent into that Country.

*Heidelberg, Oct. 8, N. S.* It is believed that the Troops which are still incamped near this City, will not break up till they shall receive Advice that the French have cauled a Part of their Army to pass the Rhine. The last Advices from Wirtemberg and the Black Forest are, that the Inhabitants had put themselves under Arms to prevent the French from penetrating farther; and that General Petrasch, who observes the Motions of the French, had been reinforced by some regular Troops.

*Francfort, Oct. 10, N. S.* His Serene Highness the Prince of Orange set out the 8th Instant from Heidelberg, and came to Manheim the same Day. His Serene Highness comes this Day to Mentz, and To-morrow he is expected in this City in his Way to Holland.

*Hague, Oct. 15, N. S.* According to the last Advices we have here from Italy, the Imperialists were in the Mantuan, having sent their Horse behind the Mincio for their better Conveniency of Foraging; that Part of the

the French Army was posted on the Oglio, and the other remained at Guastalla, which looked as if they had a Mind to lay Siege to Mirandola, where Count Konigsegg had left 400 Men. A Regulation of the States General has been lately published here, permitting all their Subjects to carry on a Trade for sixty Leagues on the Coast of Africa within the Limits of the Company during the Term of 20 Years, paying to the said Company certain Duties, and subjecting themselves to certain Rules contained in the said Regulations, and in the Charter granted to the said Company.
