Truro, Novemb. 29. E have advice here, that on Wednesday last a Dutch Privateer was cast away **V V** near *Padftow*; and that about the latter end of the laft week, an Oftender was likewife loft near the *Ligard*, the Mafter with most of his Men having been drowned.

WarfawsNovemb. 12. The Nobility finding themfelves unable any longer to subliss in the Field, by reason of the ill weather, and the want of Forage, are at length separated, and retired to their respective homes, though not without leaving behind them, the marks of their having been together, all the Country about Lublin, and the other parts where they were Encamped, being wholly ruined and deftroyed, to that degree, that the Enemy could not have made a greater havock then they have done, for be-fides the general Confumption of all kind of Provifions, there is hardly a House left flanding, or a Countrey man to be seen in all those parts, except in the Walled Towns; nor could it be otherwife expected, confidering the vast number of Men, that have been most of this Summer in the Field, who would not be obliged to that exact Discipline, as may be observed amongst other Soldiery. The King is faid to be on his way hither, having notwithstanding all the inflances of the Popes Nuncio, fworn the Treaty of Confederation, as the Nobility have each of them in particular done. We are told of a Dyet that will be held here about the beginning of Lent, when this Confederation is to be confirmed a new, in the mean time a general Convocation of the Nobility of Lithuania is appointed to be held the fixth of the next Month, and it is faid, that the King will be present there in person. We continue ftill to lay, that the Revenues of the Archbishop of Gnesne shall be taken into Sequestration, and his perfon confined to a Cloyfter. Our Letters from the *H* haine tell us, that the Collacks' begin to be very much diffatisfied with the Turkish Government, and are much inclined to free themfelves if poffible from that yoke, and to return to their Obedience to this Crown. It is yet much doubted whether the Nobility will confirm and ratifie the late Treaty concluded by our Commiffionere with the Grand Signior, elpecially fince they write, that they have been likewile forced to agree to the paying a yearly Tribute of screal Thousand Rickdollars to the Cham of Tartary. We are told, that 5000 of the Nubility are still in the Field, under the Command of Czarnecky. The Turks are retreat ed out of the Polish Territories.

Franchfort, Novemb. 27. The Auxiliary Troops continue in their old Quarters, and as yet there is not any discourse of their removal ; besides the Bridg .they have made over the Rhyn at Wey[ensu,they have layd another over the Mayn at Costbeim, so that they will have these two Rivers to pals either of them as they pleafe We are told of 700 Imperialifts, Houfe and Foot that have paffed the Rhyn, and are gone on fom defign, which is as yet kept fecret, and that 4000 of them being the Cavalry, are already arrived ney in a day or two, being in his paffage to at Bingh. Ditto, Novemb. 30 The Inperial and Brandenbuigh Troops feem refolved to winter in this Neighborhood, for here is not the least mention made of their march; The Bridg they are making over the Main, hath received fe me dammage by the high wateis, which they are about repairing, and when fini-fh.d, we are told, feveral of their Troops are to pals ovei it, to go and feek Quarters. The Troops which we told you in our laft, were passed the Rhyn, are returned again, without having done any thing confiderable that we can yet hear of, unleis it be, their having brought fome few French Prisoners with them whom they met flragling in their way.

Htrecht, Nov. 28. The French that were out, and attacked Armeyde, are returned hither again with about 100 prisoners, besides other rich booty; Colorel Bampfield, who Commanded there, sun great danger of having fallen, as did many of his Soldi-ers, into the French hands, and we fince bean, that he is imprifoned in Holland by order of the Stotes, being accused by the Inhabitants of Armeyde, of ha= virg betrayed them to the Enemy; of which they inflance as a proof, that when apprehending the French were coming down upon them, they defire their Guards might be doubled, the faid Collonel refused it, faying there was no need of it; and that upon the approach of the Enemy, his Soldiers made not any relifiance, but immediately threw down their Arms, and abandoned their Poft. Cologne, Novemb. 29. We feem here much concerned that our Army marches to and fro, without doing any thing that may be for our advantage, and now many fober Men begin to i wish they were well at home again. Our neighbors the French continue to do us daily one milchiefor another, norwithstanding all the care that we take to prevent it. From Gouda and Gorcum they ftill tell us of parties that are very often fent out from thence, and though it is always faid, that they return with a great deal of Honor and Booty, vet when we inquire into particulars, we seldom find their purchale greater, then some small quantities of Turf, or a prisoner or two, who are commonly such of the Countrey people they happen to rencounter.
