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Truro, Novemb. 29.

WE have advice here, that on Wednesday last a Dutch Privateer was cast away near *Padstow*; and that about the latter end of the last week, an Ostender was likewise lost near the *Lizard*, the Master with most of his Men having been drowned.

Warsaw, Novemb. 12. The Nobility finding themselves unable any longer to subsist in the Field, by reason of the ill weather, and the want of Forage, are at length separated, and retired to their respective homes, though not without leaving behind them, the marks of their having been together, all the Country about *Lublin*, and the other parts where they were Encamped, being wholly ruined and destroyed, to that degree, that the Enemy could not have made a greater havock then they have done; for besides the general Consumption of all kind of Provisions, there is hardly a House left standing, or a Countrey man to be seen in all those parts, except in the Walled Towns; nor could it be otherwise expected, considering the vast number of Men, that have been most of this Summer in the Field, who would not be obliged to that exact Discipline, as may be observed amongst other Soldiery. The King is said to be on his way hither, having notwithstanding all the instances of the Popes Nuncio, sworn the Treaty of Confederation, as the Nobility have each of them in particular done. We are told of a Dyet that will be held here about the beginning of Lent, when this Confederation is to be confirmed a new, in the mean time a general Convocation of the Nobility of *Lithuania* is appointed to be held the sixth of the next Month, and it is said, that the King will be present there in person. We continue still to say, that the Revenues of the Archbishop of *Gnesne* shall be taken into Sequestration, and his person confined to a Cloyster. Our Letters from the *Ukraine* tell us, that the Cossacks begin to be very much dissatisfied with the Turkish Government, and are much inclined to free themselves if possible from that yoke, and to return to their Obedience to this Crown. It is yet much doubted whether the Nobility will confirm and ratifie the late Treaty concluded by our Commissioners with the Grand Signior, especially since they write, that they have been likewise forced to agree to the paying a yearly Tribute of several Thousand Rickdollars to the Cham of *Tartary*. We are to'd, that 5000 of the Nobility are still in the Field, under the Command of *Czarnecky*. The Turks are retreated out of the Polish Territories.

Frankfort, Novemb. 27. The Auxiliary Troops continue in their old Quarters, and as yet there is not any discourse of their removal; besides the Bridge they have made over the *Rhyn* at *Weyssenau*, they have layd another over the *Mayn* at *Cosheim*, so that they will have these two Rivers to pass either of them as they please. We are told of 7000 Imperialists, Horse and Foot that have passed the *Rhyn*, and are gone on some design, which is as yet kept secret, and that 4000 of them being the Cavalry, are already arrived at *Bingh*. The Auxiliary Troops have possessed themselves of *Ingelsheym* and *Alsem* in the Palati-

nate, where they found great quantities of Forage and other Provisions; since which it is said, the Elector Palatine hath agreed to furnish them with Corn, Wine, &c. But whilst these Forces go thus on with a strong hand to exact from every body what they call necessary for themselves, the Empire make a general complaint, and cries out against their proceedings. Monsieur de *Turenne* is said to be on his march towards *Lorraine*, to join with the Prince of *Conde*, who we hear is arrived at *Zirich*.

Ditto, Novemb. 30. The Imperial and Brandenburg Troops seem resolved to winter in this Neighborhood, for here is not the least mention made of their march; The Bridge they are making over the *Main*, hath received some damage by the high waters, which they are about repairing, and when finished, we are told, several of their Troops are to pass over it, to go and seek Quarters. The Troops which we told you in our last, were passed the *Rhyn*, are returned again, without having done any thing considerable that we can yet hear of, unless it be, their having brought some few French Prisoners with them whom they met stragling in their way.

Utrecht, Nov. 28. The French that were out, and attacked *Armejde*, are returned hither again with about 100 prisoners, besides other rich booty; Colonel *Bampffield*, who Commanded there, in great danger of having fallen, as did many of his Soldiers, into the French hands, and we since hear, that he is imprisoned in *Holland* by order of the States, being accused by the Inhabitants of *Armejde*, of having betrayed them to the Enemy; of which they instance as a proof, that when apprehending the French were coming down upon them, they desired their Guards might be doubled, the said Colonel refused it, saying there was no need of it; and that upon the approach of the Enemy, his Soldiers made not any resistance, but immediately threw down their Arms, and abandoned their Post. The French are fortifying *Culenburgh*, and at the same time several Troops are gone out from hence to demolish *Montfoort*.

Cologne, Novemb. 29. The Confederate Troops keep their old Station, onely we hear, of 3000 of them that are come as far as *Creutsnach*, under the Command of the Count of *Caprara*, besides 4000 Horse that have been sent with two pieces of Cannon to *Bingh*, to Fortifie that place. The French Army marches along the *Noessel* towards *Lorraine*, and some Letters say, that Monsieur de *Turenne* was arrived in person at *Theonville*. The Duke de *Puras* is said to be coming this way.

Ditto, Dec. 2. The Brandenburg Troops have begun to commit hostilities upon the Elector of *Cologne* and the Bishop of *Munster*, having taken *Warendorp* and *Warca*, the former belonging to the Bishop of *Munster*, and the other to the Elector of *Cologne*. The Sieur *Mombas* some days since passed through this place on his way to *Paris*. The Popes Nuncio, who is going to reside with the same Character in *Poland*, may now part hence on that journey in a day or two, being in his passage to call upon some of the Princes of the Empire, and conferre with them concerning the present conjuncture.
