THE Marshal Pöninski, of the Confederation for King Augustus, arrived from Petrikow the 23d Instant, without much Interruption on the Road, though he had certain Advices that the Stanislaists waited for him in a very advantageous Post near Rava, which obliged him to go a little out of the direct Road to avoid them. General Lacy is arrived at Pultausk, and we hear has ordered that the Primate, who is still at Thorn, should be more strictly confined than before, having been credibly informed that he has writ Letters to the Palatin of Lublin, and others of his Friends, that they should use their utmost Efforts to rescue him out of the Hands of the Russians, and then every thing would go well. It is said that the Palatin of Kiowy has resigned the Command of the Army to the Starosta Jazelski, M. Tarlo, a young Man about 21 or 22 Years of Age; and that the Palatin of Volhinia, a near Relation of the Primate's, has laid down his Office of Palatin, in Hopes of being elected Marshal of a general Confederation which several of the Nobility and Gentry are about to make in Favour of King Stanislaus at their approaching Meeting at Opatow near Sendomir, whither the Castellan of Czerski is marching with his Body of Troops, having lately passed the Vistula three Miles from hence. Yesterday arrived from Saxony 24 Baggage Waggon's of the Court, besides as many more which belong to its Attendants, under a Guard of 300 Russian Dragoons and 50 Cossacks; and the last Letters from Dresden say, that the rest of the Baggage and Equipage was to set forward that Day the Post came away; whence it is concluded that the Court will soon follow.

Hague, Nov. 19, N. S. The States of Holland before their separating this Day, have disposed of all the Civil and Military Employments vacant in their Department. The States General have appointed three of their Deputies, viz. M. Gillis, Pensionary of Haerlem, M. Bandfenbourg, one of the Deputies of Guelderland, and M. Steenbergen, Deputy from Overysse, to go to Groninguen, and endeavour to compose the Differences which have been subsisting between that Town and the People of the Country for a long Time, and have occasioned great Animofities amongst them.
