Whereas by an Act made in the Fourth Year of his present Majesty, it is enacted, That if after the 24th Day of June, 1731, any Maker of Hair Powder, or any Perfumer, Puke-maker, or Barber, or any Seller of Dealer in Hair Powder, shall make, or cause to be made any Hair Powder with any Materials whatsoever other than Starch or Powder of Starch, or of Rice first made into Starch, and shall use, sell, or offer to sell any Hair Powder so made, he, she or they shall forfeit the Sum of Twenty Pounds. And whereas Complaints have been made to the Commissioners of Excise, that great Quantities of such Powder are made of Wheat Flower, and other Materials not first made into Starch, contrary to the Directions of the said Act, and sold to the Prejudice of the Revenue, and of the fair Trader, they do hereby give publick Notice, that they have ordered their Officers to inform them of all such Persons that shall offend against this Act, in order to their being prosecuted for the same.
