THE States of Holland are to assemble To-morrow. Besides a Proposal from the Emperor which they are to have under Consideration, it is said that they will take their final Resolution upon Two Millions proposed to be raised for the repairing the Fortifications of their Frontier Towns, and providing the Magazines with the necessary Stores; as also for settling a Fund for a Million voted to be granted to the North Hollanders for repairing their Dikes, to be paid in Ten Years, viz. 100,000 Florins a Year. The Commissioners of the Admiralties are sent for to take Directions for fitting out a certain Number of Frigates for the Security of the Trade in the Streights. There has been of late a Deputation from the Council of State to Boisteduc, on a Project to build Sluices there, to prevent any Enterprize against that Town, by overflowing the Ground about it where it is accessible.

Hague, Dec. 3, N. S. The States of Holland have been assembled these three Days. The Pensionary went to the Assembly this Day. The States General being informed that the Munsterians had assigned Winter-Quarters to 190 Foot and 70 Horse of Prussian Troops in the Lordship of Bronkhorst, of the Dependance of Guelderland, in which Lordship the Munsterians pretend to have some Sort of Jurisdiction, though contested by the Dutch, the said States sent some Days ago for the Ministers of Prussia and Munster, and desired them to let their respective Masters know that they will not suffer such a Thing, but will oppose it by Force of Arms; whereupon the Prussian Minister has dispatched an Express to the General who commands the Prussian Troops in the Country of Munster, and the other has taken the Matter ad referendum. Of the ten Members named at Utrecht to be admitted into the College of the

Nobles, six only have been chosen and agreed to by the Assembly of the States; the four others, viz. General de Ginkel, Count Maurice of Nassau, Count Henry de la Leck, and the Baron de Alblas, have been excluded by Reason of their being in the military Service, according to a Resolution taken some Years ago to that Effect. The Commissioners of the Admiralty are actually here, daily conferring with the States Deputies upon their Sea Affairs. By Letters from Mantua, arrived here Yesterday, of the 20th of last Month, we learn, that the Army of the Allies had abandoned the Oglio the 17th, as also Reggio and Modena, and was retired to Cremona behind the Naviglio; which News is this Day confirmed by Letters from Paris, though they don't own that the above-mentioned Places are evacuated.
