Hague, December 7, N. S.

THE Prince of Orange having received Advice, that the Princess Royal his Confort was gone from Harwich for Dover in order to pass over to Calais, left this Place on Saturday last in the Morning to go and meet her Royal Highness. The States of Holland have resumed their Assembly this Day, but very likely will separate in a few Days, the Pensionary being disabled by the Gout from assisting in the Assembly: However it is thought they will settle their Sea Affairs before they part, the Commissioners of the Admiralty continuing here, and conferring every Day with their Deputies. The Council of State are preparing as fast as possible the State of the War for the next Year, to be communicated to the said States this Session if it can be got ready; and it is said a Proposal for augmenting the Forces will be inserted in the Petition. We have an Account here, that the Germans in Italy have passed the Oglio and taken Sabionetta, where there were 250 French, who marched out by Capitulation.

Calais, Nov. 28. Her Royal Highness the Princess of Orange, embarked on the Fubbs Yacht at Dover last Night, and lay on board. At Eight this Morning the Yacht sailed, and at Three this Afternoon Her Royal Highness landed here: The very same Hour his Highness the Prince of Orange arrived here to meet Her. Her Royal Highness was very Sick in this Passage of Seven Hours, the Wind having been contrary: But since Her coming on Shore she is pretty well recovered. Their Highnesses design to proceed from hence on Saturday. The Prince came hither by the Way of Bruges, Ostend, Newport, and Furnes.

L. the other forgot; a Set of Silver Tea-Spoons, with Tongs and Strainer; a Silver Hilted Sword; a chas'd Gold Watch, the M. ker's Name Hurt, No. 362, with a Pinchbeck Chain and two Gold Seals, the larger one engrav'd in a Cornelian with the same Arms, and the small one with the Crest as above; a Metal Watch with the Dial-plate enamel'd, without a Minute Hand; a Pair of Silver capp'd Horse Pistols with a Lyon's Face; a Pair of Silver Snuffers, either with a Boar's Head engrav'd, or else no Mark; a China Tea-pot with Silver Spout; some India Tea-cups with Men and Women Figures; a Velvet Waistcoat and Breeches with Gold Buttons; a French White Silk Waistcoat richly embroidered with Gold and Silk; a Dozen and a Half of Shirts, most of them mark'd with an L. a Pair of Sheets; Clarendon's History of the Rebellion; the latest Edition of the Statutes at large; D'Anvers's Abridgment; Equity Cases abridg'd; Jacob's Law Dictionary; Hawkins's Pleas of the Crown; Weston's Short-Hand, with several other things of Value, shall receive of the said John Lawson a Reward of Fifty Pounds for the whole, and in Proportion for any Part.
