Yesterday's Letters from Dantzick assure us, that M. Poniatowski, the Marshal Belinski, and M. Thioly, set out for this Place the 4th Instant. Yesterday being the Queen's Name Day and Anniversary of her Birth, there were great Rejoycings at Court; and the Castellan of Radonf, her Marshal, gave an Entertainment and Ball after the Drawing Room in the Evening.

Hague; Dec. 24, N. S. The Prince and Princess of Orange arrived last Night at Breda: They intended to go and lie at Gorcum this Night, and to proceed to Morrow from thence by Water in a Yacht to Rotterdam, or directly by Deltshaven to Delft, whither several People are preparing to go and meet their Highnesses. The freshest Letters we have here from the Armies in Italy, are of the 8th Instant from Mantua, and import, that the Field Marshal Count Konigsegg came thither on the 1st, and set out the next Day for Governolo, after having sent Orders to several Regiments to put themselves on the March; and it was rumoured those Forces were designed to lay Siege to Guastalla. The Marshal de Broglie set out from Parma the 4th, with a Guard of 500 Foot and 500 Horse, for Guastalla; and the Marshal de Coigny was making proper Dispositions for preventing the Siege of that Place.

One Hundred Guineas, two large Silver Candlesticks engrav'd with these Arms on them, viz. a St. Andrew's Cross, with Wheatsheafs and Stars in the Field, and a Boar's Head for the Crest; two Silver Tea Canisters mark'd with the same Arms; two large Silver Spoons, the one mark'd with J. L. the other forged; a Set of Silver Tea-Spoons, with Tong and Strainer; a Silver Hilted Sword; a chas'd Gold Watch; the Maker's Name Hurt, No. 362, with a Pinchbeck Chain and two Gold Seals, the larger one engrav'd in a Cornelian with the same Arms, and the small one with the Crest as above; a Metal Watch with the Dial-plate enamel'd, without a Minute Hand; a Pair of Silver capp'd Horse Pistols with a Lyon's Face; a Pair of Silver Snuffers, either with a Boar's Head engrav'd, or else no Mark; a China Tea-pot with Silver Spout; some India Tea-cups with Men and Woman Figures; a Velvet Waistcoat and Breeches with Gold Buttons; a French White Silk Waistcoat richly embroidered with Gold and Silk; a Dozen and a Half of Shirts, most of them mark'd with an L. a Pair of Sheets; Clarendon's History
