From the Graefs chap vanden Mark we have advice, that Major Ge neral Spien, Commanding a Party of Brandenburgh Troops, had on Sunday last made an attempt upons fmall place called Wervel, in the Electorate of Volugne, in which was four Companies in Garrifton, but that having milled the fuccels he had promifed himfelf there, he was marched into the Territory of Munsher, and had taken Warden and Goppelenburgh, but of this we expect to hear farther.

From Amsterdam they write, that their East-India Ships would be very luddainly ready to Sayl, not withstanding they still very much wanted Seamen, who are all engaged in the Service of Privateers, or elle have left the Countrey, and gone and fought sheir Fortune abroad ; The people begin to be very much diffatisfied at the Armies being to far off, apprehending fome attempt from the French, efpecial-

ly if they are favoured by Frosty weather. Hague, Dec. 13. The Swedish Ambassadors that are arrived here from England, seem somewhat disfatisfied with their reception, and especially for that at their arrival at Rotterdam, they were kept two days on board the Yacht that brought them over, without being almost taken notice of by the Magi-

flrates, besides fome other disiefpect their Excellencies complain of : The States of Holland are Ilill affembled, and will continue fo till the latter end of the next week ; all their confultations are about raifing of Money, in which work we do not hear of any confiderable progress they have made. From Swol of the 8 inftant they tell us, that a Body of Brandenburgh Troops, under the Command of Major General spaen are fallen into the Stift-Munfter, and have made themielves maffers of the Castle of Houestade, a Pais on the Lip, belides some other inconfiderable places. which they have burnt and plundered.
