**T**HE Princess Royal continues in perfect Health, as does the Prince of Orange. The States of Holland are expected to meet here next Wednesday. The Governour of Venlo has informed the States, that two Sergeants and a Soldier of his Garrison being out of the Town in a Tavern not far from it, were forced away by some Prussian Officers, and that having sent to complain of that Violence to the Governour of Wesel, towards which Place they were carried, he had answered, he had heard nothing of it. M. Lullius, the King of Prussia's Resident here, has delivered this Day his Credentials to the States, as Envoy Extraordinary from his Prussian Majesty.

**P**aris, Jan 8, N. S. Letters from Cremona of the 27th past advise that the King of Sardinia set out from thence on the 21st, proposing to reach Turin by the 24th. The Army of the Allies, and that of the Imperialists, continued in their former Posts. We have an Account from Naples, that on the 8th of last Month a Council was held, in which it was resolved, that 2000 Men of the Spanish Troops now in that Kingdom, should be sent to join the Army of the Allies, in Lombardy; and that they should begin their March on the 1st Instant.

Whereas an anonymous Letter directed to Madam Miller, on Mays Hill, was on Tuesday last the 24th Instant, about Ten o'Clock in the Evening, thrown into the Court Yard of Mary Miller, Widow, in the Parish of Greenwich, in the County of Kent, subscribed P. S. T. F. L. R. J. N. G. L. B. D. M. E. C. S. J. R. threatening, that, in Case she did not that very Night, leave Ten Guineas under a Brick, the third Post down-

wards from her Door, she might be sure to have her House surrounded and plundered, and afterwards burnt to the Ground, and her Young Son taken away, and disposed of in the West Indies, that she might never see him more: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in so heinous a Crime, is pleased to promise His most Gracious Pardon, to any one concerned in writing the said Letter, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he, or they, be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a further Encouragement, she said Mary Miller does hereby Promise a Reward of Fifty Pounds to any Person or Persons making such Discovery as aforesaid, to be paid upon Conviction of the Offender or Offenders.

Whitehall, January 3, 1734.

Whereas Informations have been given upon Oath, that on Thursday the 19th Day of December last, about the Hour of Seven in the Evening, Six armed Men, with their Faces masked and disguised, rushed with Violence into the Dwelling-House of Ambrose Skinner, a Purser, at King's Bridge, in the Parish of Barking, in the County of Essex, and after having bound his Hands, compelled him to walk about his said House with them from one Room to another, to discover where his Money and Effects lay; after which they took his Purse and Keys out of his Pocket, and therewith attempted to open all the Chests and Trunks belonging to him, his Son and Daughters-in-Law, who dwell in that same House with him, but finding this said Key did not answer their Expectations, they immediately broke open all the said Chests and Trunks, and took from thence, and from his said Dwelling-House, upwards of Forty Seven Pounds in ready Money, with several Pieces of Plate, Goods, Linnen, and wearing Apparel, to the Value of Three Hundred Pounds; and also two Harps out of the Stable of the said Ambrose Skinner, to enable them to carry off their Spoil. And that on Saturday the 21st Day of the same Month, about Six in the Evening, several armed Persons, with their Faces disguised, some with Black, and some with White Colours, violently entered into the Dwelling House of William Mason, Keeper for the Right Honourable the Earl Tilney, at Heynault-Lodge in Waltham Forest, in the Parish of Dagenham, in the said County of Essex, and out of
