Warsaw, January 19, N. S.

AFFAIRS since the 12th Instant have begun to take a pretty favourable Turn for King Augustus; the Palatin of Kiovy, in Concert with the Grand Marshal Munizcek, has very lately sent his Propositions, and demanded an Armistice in his own Name, and in the Name of the Army; he has also desired that Commissaries should be sent to a Place that shall be agreed upon, in order to their Capitulation: Whereupon King Augustus has appointed Major General Lewvendahl, and two or three Members of the Confederation for that Purpose, and they are to set out very soon, waiting only the Arrival of General Lacy from Wengrow, to give his Directions for the Armistice. Here are positive Accounts from Lithuania, that the Districts or Territories of Osmania, Minsk, and Lida, have sent their Deputies to General Ismailow to acknowledge King Augustus, and to desire to be exempted from Contributions. The 17th Instant being the Anniversary of the Coronation of King Augustus, great Rejoicings were made upon that Occasion. The same Day, unexpectedly to every Body, his Majesty confirmed Prince Czartorinski, Palatin of Ruffia, in his Post of Commander in Chief of the Crown Guards.

Berlin, Jan. 22, N. S. Yesterday at Noon the King of Prussia came hither from Potsdam, and this Morning he appeared at the Parade on Horseback. Prince Lichtenstein is expected here in a few Days from Vienna, being charged with a Commission from the Emperor to his Prussian Majesty.

Berlin, Jan. 25, N. S. Colonel Ponikau, the Saxon Minister, has received a Letter from M. Bruhl, acquainting him, that the Crown Army, under the Palatin of Kiovy, had made Offers of submitting themselves to King Augustus. Yesterday being the Prince Royal's Birth-day, his Royal Highness gave a great Entertainment on that Occasion, at which their Prussian Majesties assisted.
