Westminster, February 28.

HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Charles Dalton, Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers, the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for continuing the Duties upon Malt, Mum, Cyder, and Perry, in that Part of Great Britain called England, and for granting to his Majesty certain Duties upon Malt, Mum, Cyder, and Perry, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Thirty-five.

Berlin, March 1, N. S. Letters from several Parts of Poland have brought a Confirmation of the Palatin of Kiovia's having submitted to King Augustus, with about 2000 Men of the Crown Army which were under his Command, and that the remaining Part of that Army was gone over to Count Tarlo. Other Letters advise, that the Bishop of Cujavia, who had been sent to the said Count Tarlo with very advantageous Offers, is returned to Warsaw without effecting any thing. M. Brackel, the Russian Minister, arrived here Yesterday. Count Wartenfleben, his Prussian Majesty's Minister at the Court of Denmark, is come hither to settle his private Affairs, which have required his Presence since the Death of his Mother.

Hague, March 8, N. S. M. de Borselen, who was several Years Envoy Extraordinary in England from this State, and a Deputy of Zealand to the States General, died here last Saturday. By his Decease the Place of Receiver General of the Domaines in the District of Bolduc in Brabant, became vacant; which being in the Gift of the Council of State, the Members of that Council drew Lots to Day, as usual, who should have the Disposal of it, and it fell to M. Hop, Brother to their High Mightinesses Minister at the Court of Great Britain. It is an Employment that brings in Six thousand Florins yearly.

St. James's March 1.

This Day being the Anniversary of her Majesty's Birth-day, her Majesty received at Noon the Compliments of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction of both Sexes. The Appearance was very numerous and extremely splendid. At Night there is to be a Ball. On this Occasion the Guns in the Park, and at the Tower were fired, and other publick Rejoycings made in London and Westminster, as usual.

Whitehall, Feb. 26, 1734.

And as a farther Encouragement for such Discovery, his Majesty is also pleased to promise a Reward of Fifty Pounds for every one of the Criminals that shall be discovered and apprehended as aforesaid, to be paid upon the Conviction of the Offender or Offenders.
