*Warsaw, February 19, N. S.*

**W**E have Accounts from Czencow that M. Tarlo Palatin of Lublin, and the Starosta Jacelski, with the Confederates for King Stanislaus, march'd the 14th Instant from thence in three Columns for Great Poland, and it is supposed will proceed to Polish Prussia, Major General Steinflicht commanding the Vanguard. We hear that the said Confederates have sent the Castellan of Czerk's Son to Konigsberg, to desire most instantly of King Stanislaus to acquaint them what Support they are to expect, and that in Case they cannot be assured of speedy Succours, he would permit their making Terms for themselves with this Court, it being impossible for them alone to maintain his Cause any longer, the Force against them being too powerful. Some Days ago Major General Lowendahl sent hither the Articles of the Armistice that has been agreed upon between the Russians and Saxons with the Palatin of Kiowy. We are even told, that every thing is as good as finished between the said Palatin and this Court, and that he has already ordered Te Deum to be Sung at Kaminieck for King Augustus, and caused his Troops to take an Oath of Fidelity to him. He, with the Grand Marhal Mniczcheck, the Castellan of Cracovy, the Palatin of Podolia, the Crown Master of the Viedlopolski, M. Braniski, and several other Persons of Distinction, are expected here soon. Colonel Sibilski is just returned with his Body of Light-Horse, and has brought with him several Prisoners, two or three Pair of Kettle-Drums, Colours, and a considerable Booty. It is reported, that four Companies of Foot belonging to the Palatin of Lublin's Division, have been surpris'd by the Saxons, and forty of them killed.

*Warsaw, Feb. 24, N. S.* Since the 19th Instant we have had very little News of the March of the Palatin of Lublin with the Confederates: A Person that arrived here Yesterday reports, that near Kalish he left a small Detachment of Saxon Horse, with Lieutenant General Birckholts at the Head of them, (who were convoying 40,000 Ducats, sent from Dresden,) engaged with 4 or 5000 Poles.

*Berlin, March 5, N. S.* The Duke of Bevern having received on Tuesday last an Express from Wolfenbittel, with an Account that the Duke of that Name lay dangerously ill, he, his Dutchess, and the Hereditary Prince his Son, left this Place early the next Morning; and we have since heard that the Duke of Wolfenbittel is dead. Yesterday in the Evening the King of Prussia had an Express from the Frontiers, which brought him the News, that a Detachment of the Troops under Count Tarlo, commanded by General Steinflicht, had attacked and defeated a Saxon Convoy conducted by Major General Birckholts, with about 600 Dragoons. These Letters add, that General Birckholts was very much wounded and taken Prisoner, and that most of his Detachment were cut to Pieces. That the Saxons had also lost several Thousand Ducats, designed for the Payment of their Troops; three or four Hundred Pair of Boots, and a good Quantity of Stores and Ammunition. The Letters from Warsaw of the 24th of February, N. S. which are just come in, confirm these Advices.
