Warfaw, March 3, N. S.

HE Bishop of Cujavia has sent hi-ther from Czenstockow a Letter he had received from the Palatin of Lublin, which mentions Lieutenant General Birckholtz's being taken Prisoner, and wounded in two or three Places, but not mortally, and that the Palatin offers to exchange him against the Primate. He tells the Bishop he could have done much more Mischief to the Saxons, and pretends to make a Merit of having spared them: He proposes an Armistice, and that his Troops may remain in the Palatinates of Posen and Kalish, and that he may have the Permission of sending an Hundred Persons to Koningsberg, having had no Account of late from thence, though he had sent to desire forthwith a positive Answer to several Points, before he could enter into a Negociation with this Court. The Palatins of Volhinia and Vitepsk have fignified to the Prince of Helle Hombourg their being disposed to submit to King Augustus, upon certain Conditions, which it is said the Court can't well accept, but make no Doubt those Palatins will come to more reasonable Terms soon. The first is Potocki, who commands a Division that has been in and about the Palatinate of Volhinia; and the other is a Person of Credit and Interest in Lithuania, who has also some Troops under his Command. M. Poccey has been marching his Division about that Dutchy, where the Russians were not, and is said to be now returning to Bresez. The Armistice be now returning to Bresez. The Armistice with the Palatin of Kiovy is prolonged for ten Days. The General Council ended Yesterday, pretty much to the Satisfaction of all present. Colonel Sibilsky is gone in Pursuit after the Palatin of Lublin and the Confederates, with 500 Light Horse, which are to be joined by 500 Russian Dragoons, 200 Foot, and some Pieces of Cannon. The First Instant 500 of the Crown Guards arrived from Brody, where they capitulated with the Prince of Hesse Hombourg, and at the same submitted themselves to King Augustus. A Russian Regiment of Foot is coming bither to assist the Saxons in their Augustus. A Russiam Regiment of Foot is coming bither to assist the Saxons in their Duty, a great Part of them being sick. In the Regiment of Prince Xavier, there are above 600 incapable of Service, and 150 already dead of the Spotted Fever, which begins to communicate among the Inhabitants of this Place. In the Neighbouring Villages we hear of abundance of Poor People dying for want of Sustenance; and the Desolation is so great every where, that the Plague is much seared. The Officers named to command the 6000 Saxons to be sent upon the Rhine, are, Lieutenant General Frise, Count

Rudowski, and Baron Lewendahl, Major Generals.

Berlin, March 12, N. S. Besides the Advantage obtained by the Poles over the Saxon Party commanded by General Birckholtz, we hear there has been another little Action at a small Fort or Castle, called Karga, upon the River Warta, where there was a Sax-on Garrison, which was forced to surrender: Since then, the Poles, to the Number of 18 or 20000 Men, are come to the Banks of the Oder, their Defign being, as its publickly affirmed, to make an Irruption into Lusatia and Saxony; and some Advices from the Frontiers say, great Numbers of them have actually passed that River at Crossen, a Town belonging to his Prussian Majesty.

Dublin, March 1.

This being Her Majesty's Birth-Day, the Great Guns were fired at the Barracks, and answered by Vollies from the Regiments in Garrison which were drawn out upon Oxmantown-Green. At Noon the Lords Justices met at the Castle, and received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction, before whom an Ode, set to Musick, was performed: At Night there was a Play given by their Excellencies for the Entertainment of the Ladies; and there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other usual Demonstrations of Ioy.
