Warsaw, April 14, N. S.

BY the Letters from hence of the 7th Instant an Account was given, that we had News the Palatin of Lublin with his Body of Forces of the Party of King Stanislaus, had retired towards the Mountains upon the Frontiers of Hungary: We are since informed that they soon changed their March, and their Intention seemed to be to join M. Poccey in Lithuania; but the Russians have pursued them so close, that they have effectually prevented that Design, by putting them into the utmost Consternation and Confusion. They marched in three Columns, M. Zagwoyski commanding one of them, the Palatin of Lublin himself another, and the Castellan of Czersk the third and most considerable. M. Zagwoyski fell into the Russians Hands near Pinczow, between Cracow and Opatow, where, after a brave Defence, as to his Person, but not supported, he was killed, which so disheartened his Division, that they resolved to make their Submission to this Court, by the Means of M. Poniatowsky; accordingly when they came near this Place, they sent an Officer to him in the Name of 22 Troops or Companies, to let him know that they were all ready to submit themselves to King Augustus: He immediately acquainted them by Order of the Court, that they would be well receiv'd, and on the 12th Instant they sent their Deputies to make their Submission, which was done Yesterday: Nine other Troops have also submitted voluntarily; and twelve Troops which were passing the Vistula, where an Island is in the Middle of the River, being surpris'd by the Russians, laid down their Arms upon the Island, and surrendered themselves Prisoners of War. P. S. The 22 Troops that were commanded by M. Zagwoyski, as mentioned above, are actually passing the Vistula in Boats from Praag, to be review'd by King Augustus this Afternoon.

Warsaw, April 21, N. S. Our Letters of the 14th Instant related the great Advantages the Russians had gained over the Stanislaists; which have continued with such Success, that they have at last subdued the whole Polish Army that was upon the ancient Establishment, except two Troops or Companies, which resolved to share the Fate of the Palatin of Lublin, but were at length obliged to separate from him, that he might the more safely make his Escape; being pursued so close by the Russians, that he was forced to take with him only three or four Domesticks, and it is now supposed he is got into the Dominions of the King of Prussia: The Castellan of Czersk had one and fifty Troops that were surrounded by the Russians; which have acknowledged King Augustus and promised to serve him faithfully. M. Poniatowski was sent to make the Agreement with this Castellan and his Division, and arrived here with the said Castellan the 19th, who had Yesterday a private Audience of King Augustus, the Bishop of Cracow only being present. Major Lewen, a Russian Officer, having under his Command 100 Dragoons, came hither a few Days ago with 18 of the Polish Troops, 12 of which were those that surrendered themselves Prisoners of War upon an Island of the Vistula, and the other 6 acknowledged voluntarily King Augustus. This Court reckons, that by one means or other, they have got of the Army of the Confederates of Dzikow, since they left Karga, 109 Troops, and that there is no Corps of any Consideration in the whole Kingdom against them; they allow there may be some little Parties of 100 or 200 Men each: The next Business will be to endeavour to subdue M. Poccey, and the other Divisions in Lithuania, making in all about 500 Men, which is now hoped will not take up much Time, and that this Court may immediately proceed upon Deliberations for a general Pacification.
