THIS Morning one of His Majesty's Messengers brought the good News of His Majesty's Arrival at Hanover (in perfect Health, God be praised) on Wednesday last, at Five of the Clock in the Afternoon.

His Majesty has been pleased to present William Thomlinson, Clerk and Master of Arts, to the Rectory of Sigglesthrope alias Seglesthrope, in the County and Diocese of York, void by the Death of John Garnett, the last Incumbent.

His Majesty has been pleased to appoint Fitz Roy Henry Lee, Esq; to be Governour and Commander in Chief of the Island of Newfoundland, in the Room of the Lord Muskerry.

His Majesty has been pleased to direct Letters Patents to be passed under the Great Seal of Ireland, for incorporating a Society for the Maintenance of the Widows and Children of deceased Clergymen in the Diocese of Derry.

His Majesty has been pleased to direct Letters Patents to be passed under the Great Seal of Ireland, containing a Grant to John Butler, Esq; of the Office of Clerk of the Pipe and Ingrosser of the Great Roll in the Court of Exchequer in the said Kingdom.

Whereas on the 18th of April last, Mr. Newby, Collector of His Majesty's Customs at Woodbridge in Suffolk, having received Information of some Tea being lodged in a House in Seymour near Hadleigh, did, with the Assistance of another Officer of the Customs, and a Serjeant and three Dragoons, seize in an Ambush Ten Bags containing near Four Hundred Weight of Tea, which he secured at the Excise Office at Hadleigh that Night: And as he was carrying the same the next Day to the Custom-house at Ipswich, they were attacked on the Road about a Mile from Hadleigh, by above Twenty Persons on Horseback, who were all armed with Blunderbusses, Fowling Pieces, Pistols, and other Weapons, fired on the Officers and Dragoons, carried away the Tea, and shot William Cam, one of the Dragoons, in the Shoulder, of which Wound he died the next Day; and wounded the Serjeant and two other Dragoons, killed two of their Horses, and wounded another. — And it appearing upon Oath, that William Neale and John Harvey of Boxford, Henry Clarke of Hingleham, Miller; William Russell of Seamar, Benjamin Witherell of Seamar, Yeoman; Benedictus Posford of Seamar; William Posford of Seamar; Samuel Leman of Bildeston, Comber; William Cock of Hadleigh, Locksmith; John Ranson of Hingleham, Blacksmith; James Ponder of Monks Eleigh, Samuel Gallant of the same, and others were acting in the said Murder and Rescue. — His Majesty is pleased to promise His most Gracious Pardon to any two of the Persons concerned, (except the said Neale and Harvey, or the said Clarke, who it is supposed kill'd the said Cam, or the Person who is shall appear did actually kill him) in Case they shall be the Means of apprehending any of the other Offenders beforementioned, or shall discover and apprehend any of the Offenders, whose Names are not here named, so as that they or any of them shall be convicted of the Murder. — And for a further Encouragement for such Discovery, and for apprehending the Offenders, His Majesty is pleased to promise a Reward of

One Hundred Pounds each, for apprehending the said William Neale, John Harvey, and Henry Clarke, or either of them; and Fifty Pounds each for apprehending the said William Russell, Benjamin Witherell, Benedictus Posford, William Posford, Samuel Leman, William Cock, John Ranson, James Ponder, and Samuel Gallant, or any of the rest of the Offenders, so as that they be convicted of the Murder, to be paid by the Receiver General of the Customs.
