BY our last Letters from Poland, and Königsberg we have Advices, that the Russians, under the Command of General Biron, had pursued some Polish Parties, the Remains of M. Pocloy's dispersed Army, as far as Angersburg, a Town in his Prussian Majesty's Dominions, where, or in that Neighbourhood, the said Russians had, in several Rencounters, killed or taken Prisoners a great Number of the Poles. The Prince of Lichtenstein left this Place on Monday Evening last on his Return to Vienna. The Court is expected in Town in a few Days from Potzdam; and they say the General Review will be made here, as usual, towards the latter End of the next Week.

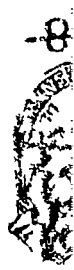
Copenhagen, May 31, N. 8. The Danish Court, augmented by the Princess Dowager of Oost-Frise, is now removed from Walløe to Hirschholm, where they talk of spending Six Weeks. 'Tis generally believed that the King of Denmark intends this Summer to visit Laland, Falster and the other little Islands in the Baltick belonging to his Dominions.

Hanover, June 7, N. 8. On Sunday the 23th of last Month, his Majesty landed at Helvoetsluys, between Five and Six in the Afternoon, under a triple Discharge of the Cannon, and went immediately in a Coach for the Brille, where he was saluted by a Discharge of the Cannon from the Ramparts, and cross'd over to Maestlandsluys; from whence his Majesty proceeded to Rotterdam, and passed through that City between Eight and Nine in the Evening, being also saluted by a triple Discharge of the Cannon there, and arriv'd at Utrecht after Midnight, and rested at M. Pouchoud's, his Majesty's Electoral Commissary at that Place. The next Morning, being Monday the 30th, his Majesty set forward about Eight, and came to Bentheim that Evening, where his Majesty was likewise saluted by a triple Discharge of the Cannon from the Castle, and supped and rested there that Night: To which

Place from Maestlandsluys, his Majesty was attended by Parties of Dutch Troops. The next Morning, being Tuesday, the 31st, his Majesty set out from thence for Dippelau, attended by Parties of Dragoons, of his own Troops, and got thither about Seven in the Evening, and was complimented by a great Number of Persons of Distinction on his safe Arrival in his German Dominions. His Majesty supped and lay there that Night, and the next Morning, the 1st Instant, his Majesty set forward about Nine for Herrenhausen, attended by fresh Parties of Dragoons, where he arriv'd about Five a Clock in the Afternoon, in perfect Health, and was received and complimented by the Regency, and a great Number of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction. Last Night between Nine and Ten, the Right Honourable the Lord Harrington arriv'd here, and this Day his Lordship waited on his Majesty at Herrenhausen.

Hague, June 10, N. 8. To-morrow the Prince of Orange, with the Princess Royal, will set out from hence for Soesdyk, where they will stay some Days, and then go to Friesland; they will afterwards go to Guelderland, and pass some Time at Loo and Dieren; his Highness's making the Campaign being not yet absolutely determined. There was a Conference Yesterday between Mr. Walpole, the Deputies of this State, and the three Ministers of the Powers in Alliance, to whom a Resolution of their High Mightrinesses on the present State of Affairs was delivered.

Whereas on the 18th of April last, Mr. Newby, Collector of His Majesty's Customs at Woodbridge in Suffolk, having received Information of some Tea being lodged in a House in Seymour near Hadleigh, did, with the Assistance of another Officer of the Customs, and a Serjeant and three Dragoons, seize in an Alms-house Ten Bags containing near Four Hundred Weight of Tea, which he secured at the Excise Office at Hadleigh that Night; and as he was carrying the same the next Day to the Custom-house at Ipswich, they were attacked on the Road about a Mile from Hadleigh, by above Twenty Persons on Horseback, who were all armed with Blunderbusses, Fowling Pieces, Pistols;



Pistols, and other Weapons, fired on the Officers and Dragoons, carried away the Tea, and shot William Cam, one of the Dragoons, in the Shoulder; of which Wound he died the next Day; and wounded the Sergeant and two other Dragoons, killed two of their Horses, and wounded another. — And it appearing upon Oath, that William Neale and John Harvey of Boxford, Henry Clarke of Hintslesham, Miller; William Russell of Seamar, Benjamin Witherell of Seamar, Yeoman; Benedictus Posford of Seamar; William Posford of Seamar; Samuel Leman of Bildeston, Comber; William Cock of Hadleigh, Locksmith; John Ranson of Hintslesham, Blacksmith; James Ponder of Monks Eleigh, Samuel Gallant of the same, and others were acting in the said Murder and Rescue. — His Majesty is pleased to promise His most Gracious Pardon to any two of the Persons concerned, (except the said Neale and Harvey, or the said Clarke, who it is supposed kill'd the said Cam, or the Person who it shall appear did actually kill him) in Case they shall be the Means of apprehending any of the other Offenders beforementioned, or shall discover and apprehend any of the Offenders, whose Names are not here named, so as that they or any of them shall be convicted of the Murder. — And for a further Encouragement for such Discovery, and for apprehending the Offenders, His Majesty is pleased to promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds each, for apprehending the said William Neale, John Harvey, and Henry Clarke, or either of them; and Fifty Pounds each for apprehending the said William Russell, Benjamin Witherell, Benedictus Posford, William Posford, Samuel Leman, William Cock, John Ranson, James Ponder, and Samuel Gallant, or any of the rest of the Offenders, so as that they be convicted of the Murder, to be paid by the Receiver General of the Customs.
