Warsaw, June 9, N. S.

THE Primate has sent hither his Secretary, with whom came the President of the Tribunal of Lublin, who had been dispatched to him by his Friends to bring him over to King Augustus's Party; and by these Persons the Primate has sent Letters to the Bishop of Cracow, and others, acknowledging King Augustus as his Master, and King of Poland, and promising to do all he can towards a Pacification. He desired that a Guard of Poles might be sent to Thorn to conduct him to Lowitz, his usual Place of Residence, 13 Miles distant from hence; but as the Russians had just before received Orders to convey him to Pultausk, and he being now actually upon the Road, the Felt Marshal Munich has sent fresh Orders, which will meet him at Plosk, for conducting him to Lowitz, and shewing him all possible Honours and Civilities. He is also to be made acquainted at the same Time, that a Polish Guard will be immediately sent to Lowitz, for the Safety of his Person, and out of Regard to his Dignity: And as several of his Friends intend to go to meet him there, it is not doubted but he will soon come with them to this City. The Council was opened on Monday last, in which it was unanimously agreed that a Diet should be held as soon as possible; and it is thought it will be fixed To-morrow for the Month of September.

Von Stuterheim, Grand Marshal to the Duke of Saxe Eisenach, who is sent hither on the Part of his most Serene Highness, to compliment the King on his Arrival in his German Dominions; has had his Audience of his Majesty. The two Brothers the Barons the Volgt, the one a Privy Counsellor of the Margrave of Brandebourg-Bareuth, and the other High Steward to the Margrave of Brandebourg-Anspach, who are sent hither on the same Occasion by their respective Masters, had their Audiences Yesterday.
