**O**N Tuesday the 28th of last Month, M. Von Stuterheim, Grand Marshal to the Duke of Saxe Eisenach, who was sent hither on the Part of his most Serene Highness, to compliment the King on his safe Arrival in his German Dominions, had his Audience of Leave of his Majesty, and set out next Morning for his Court, well satisfied with the Reception he had met with here. The same Day in the Evening Prince Frederick, Son to Prince William of Hesse, took his Leave of his Majesty, and set out Yesterday Morning for Cassel. Yesterday at Noon the Deputies of the City of Hambourg, sent to compliment his Majesty on his Arrival here, had their Audience of the King; after which, Prince Lubomirsky and General Bauditz were presented to his Majesty.

Victualling-Office, June 27, 1735.

The Commissioners for Victualling His Majesty's Navy give Notice, That on Wednesday the 30th Day of July next, in the Forenoon, they will be ready to receive Proposals in writing, sealed up, at their Office on Tower-Hill, from all such Persons as are willing to serve His Majesty's Navy with Butter, Suffolk and Cheshire Cheese, for the Year ensuing, ending at Michaelmas 1736.

The Committee for Letting the Cities Lands in the Account of the Chamberlain of the City of London, give Notice, that they intend to Let by Lease or Grant, the Liberty of Lighting the City of London, and Liberties thereof, with Globular Glass Lamps, according to the Pattern or Specimen in the Comptroller's Office in the Guildhall London, for Twenty One Years from Midsummer 1736; which said Lamps are to be light up every Night at the setting of the Sun, from the 10th Day of August to the 10th Day of April in every Year, and are to continue burning until One of the Clock in the Morning, and are to be set up at the Distance of Thirty Yards from each other, on each Side of the Street, even with the Posts of the Foot Passage in the great or High Streets, and in the smaller and lesser Streets not exceeding the Distance of Thirty five Yards, or as the Alderman, Deputy, and Common-Council-men of each Ward shall direct. And that the said Committee will sit in the Council Chamber of the Guildhall aforesaid on the 23d Day of July next, at Four of the Clock in the Afternoon, to receive Proposals for the Purposes aforesaid; and in the mean time the Pattern or Specimen may be seen at the Comptroller's Office aforesaid.
