ON Friday last in the Evening, his Highness Prince William of Hesse, who came hither some Weeks ago to pay his Respects to the King, took his Leave of his Majesty at Herrenhausen, and set out the next Morning from hence for Cassel, extremely well satisfied with the great Honours and Respect shewn him during his Highness's Stay here. Count Noitz, who arrived here on Friday last in the Evening, was introduced the next Day to an Audience of the King, and complimented his Majesty on the Part of the Prince of Schwartzbourg Sunderhausen his Master, upon his Majesty's Arrival here. The Baron de Lowe, Dean of Hildesheim, had Yesterday his Audience of the King, and complimented his Majesty upon the same Occasion, on the Part of the Elector of Cologne.
