Venice', Dec. 13. Our Letters from Conflansinople affure us, that the Grand Signior was on his return to Adrianople, leaving the Grand Vifier to difpolo of his Armies into their winter Quarters , they likewife speak of new diforders at Mecqua, which it is feared may prove the more dangerous, because they frem to be of a long contrivance y the Inhabitants thereabouts having on feveral occasions made known their diffatisfaction to the present Government , and their readinels to enter into an open rebellion , which perhaps they thought they had now a fit opportunity to put in execution, whill the Grand Signior was engaged in a War against the Crown of Poland; That the Cossacks do of late very much infest the Black Sed, whither they come in Imall Boars in which they are carried to and fro with extraordinary swiftness, they have burnt and pillaged several Villages, belonging to the Turks, and are in a po-flure to do much more michief. The Turkish Gallies keep close in Harbors leaving the Christian Gallies absolute Mafters of the Seas, to the great interruption of their Trade, there being hardly any of their Veffels that can securely pais out or into the Archipelage.

Ratisbonne, Dec. 15. The matter of the Memorials given in by the Brandenburgh Ministers, having been at feveral times with much earneftnels debated in this Dict, it wat at length concluded that the Mediation of the Empire should be offered for adjusting matters between his most Christian Majefty and the Elector of Brandenburgh, which work receiwed yesterday its final conclusion, fo that we may now expect to hear what effect it may have ; The Deputies of the Elector Palatine make great com-plaints in the Diet against the proceeding of the Confederate Troops, who without the least controul, deftroy his Country and ruine his Subjects, making no diffinction between those they call Friends or Enemies ; for which the Elector Palatinenor onely demands reparation, but defires care may be taken to free his Countrey from such diffurbances for the future, what the Diet will do in this matter, is not as yet known, though it is thought they will take it the more to heart, because the complaint is so general of all those parts which these Troops paffed, or have been quartered near. We are told of Commiffions that are given out by the Emperor for the raifing of Men in the parts hereabouts; and at the lame time the Electors of Saxony and Bavaria, are about making new Levies likewile, fo that the whole Empire feems ready to be engaged on one fide or other.

Hambrough, Decemb. 26. The Marquis de Fenquierts, Ambaffador from his most Christian Majefty to the Crown of Sweden, passed some days fince through this place, without making any flay here, on his way to Stockholme ; from whence our Letters tell us , that the fixth of this Month , way appointed for the Coronation of the young King; That the Velt-Heer Wrangle, will not come over to his Government of Pomeren till Spring, when he

will bring feveral Troops with him, being defigned to Command the Forces which that Crown intends to have then on foot in Germany, and which it is faid, will make up a confiderable Body of Men; The Duke of Helftein, who is Bishop of Euthin, and Major General for that Crown, is lately arrived at Gottorf, to raile Men, and we are told of other Leavies, which the Swedes are making in feveral parts. From Copenhagen we hear, that the Princols of Tarante was arrived there, and had been refpect; we are at prefent very quiet in all these parts, and hear not of any confiderable Action that hath happened of late; the Brandenburgh Troops, unt der the Command of Major General Space, who laten ly made some noise in Westphalia, are retreated again to the Quarters from whence they were at first drawn ; and in return we bear, that the Bifhop of Munfters Forces have very lately made themi lives Matters of two or three places belonging to the Elector of Brandenburgh.

Compiegue, Dec. 29. Their Majefties parting the 22 in the morning from the Louvre in Parts, dined that day in the Fauxburgh of Senlis, and lodged at Verrerie, the next day their Majefties dined at the Groix de S. Ouen, and arrived here about two in the afternoon, where they were received by the Magiftrates and Inhabitants, with all the folemnity ulual on like occasions. The 24 the King received the confirmation of the raifing the Siege before Charle-roy; Yesterday and to day the King took the divertilement of Hunting, and having now advice, that the Prince of Orange was retired with his Forces in a very bad condition towards Holland ; and that the Spanish Troops, who had the greatest hand in this Siege, were likewife retreated into their feveral quarters ; his Majefty resolves to part hence to morrow or next day at farthest, with the whole Court for St. Germains.

Paris, Dec. 31. This night the King is expedied at 3. Germains from Compiegne , there appearing fince the retreat of the Enemy to their feveral Quarters, not any farther occasion for his Majesties abode there. Here is lately arrived the Count Perfis, Bovoye Extraordinary from the Elector of Bavaria, and expects at the Kings return to S. Germains to have Audience; The King to recompense the good services of the Count de Montal, which he hath performed on feveral occations, and especially now lately at Charleroy, has made him his Lieutenant in Burgundy, a Command of great Honour, and Truft. From Ger many we have not any fresh news ; it is still reported that the Confederate Armies are marched towards Weftphalfs, and that the Prince of Conde and Mon+ feur de Turenne, who have now joyned their Forces together, intend to follow them. Great preparations are making here against Spring.
