**O**N the 19th Instant M. Nischwitz had an Audience of the King, and complimented his Majesty upon his happy Arrival in this Country, on the Part of his Master his Highness Duke Christian Lewis, Administrator of Mecklenbourg. On the 22d the Baron de Ridefell, who was come hither upon the same Occasion on the Part of the Landgrave of Hesse Darmstadt, had his Audience of Leave of his Majesty, and is preparing to return to his Court. On the 23d, about Eight a-Clock in the Morning, the King, attended by my Lord Harrington, the Foreign Ministers, and several other Persons of Distinction, went to Wisenbrook Forest, near Celle, where the Peasants had brought into the Toils several wild Beasts; and his Majesty after the Diversion of shooting some wild Boars and Foxes, returned about Six in the Evening to Herenhausen. The same Day the Right Hon. the Earl of Rockingham arrived here from his Travels in Italy, and other Parts of Europe; and in the Evening waited on the King at Herenhausen, who received him very graciously; and on Monday the 25th, in the Evening, his Lordship took his Leave of his Majesty, and set out Yesterday Morning for the Hartz, from whence he intends to pass into France in his Return to England.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the better Government of the Charity for the Relief of poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice to all such Widows as aforesaid, whose Husbands died on or since the 30th of August, 1732, that Copies of the said Rules as Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth, as also with the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford and Woolwich, and the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where they may be informed of all Particulars which entitle such Widows to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose: But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-

mentioned, may apply by Letter to Thomas Corbett, Esq; at the Admiralty Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Court of Assistants for Management of the said Charity do hereby give Notice, that they will meet at the Admiralty Office on Tuesday the 9th of September, at Eight of the Clock in the Morning, to receive the Claims of such Widows, as shall be qualified according to the said Rules and Orders.

Trinity House, London, July 19, 1735.

The Master, Wardens, and Assistants of the Trinity House give Notice, that they have laid a white Buoy upon the East End of the Lower Middle in the Swinn, in three Fathom and a Half at Low Water; and that they have likewise replaced the Whitaker Beacon.

The Committee for Letting the Cities Lands in the Account of the Chamberlain of the City of London, give Notice, that they intend to Let by Lease or Grant, the Liberty of Lighting the City of London, and Libertties thereof, with Globular Glass Lamps, according to the Pattern or Specimen in the Comptroller's Office in the Guildhall London, for Twenty One Years from Midsummer 1736; which said Lamps are to be light up every Night at the setting of the Sun, from the 10th Day of August to the 10th Day of April in every Year; and are to continue burning until One of the Clock in the Morning, and are to be set up at the Distance of Thirty Yards from each other, on each Side of the Street, even with the Posts of the Foot Passage in the great or High Streets, and in the smaller and lesser Streets not exceeding the Distance of Thirty five Yards, or as the Alderman, Deputy, and Common-Council-men of each Ward shall direct. And that the said Committee will sit in the Council Chamber of the Guildhall aforesaid, on the 23d Day of July Instant, at Four of the Clock in the Afternoon, to receive Proposals for the Purposes aforesaid; and in the mean time the Pattern or Specimen may be seen at the Comptroller's Office aforesaid.

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
