Warsaw, July 20, N. S.

THE Primate of this Kingdom arriving here on the 15th Instant, had a solemn Audience of King Augustus the next Day; when he made a Speech, in which having acknowledged his Majesty to be his lawful Sovereign, recommended the People to his Care and Favour, and wished him a long and happy Reign, he promised to use most sincerely his best Endeavours, during the Remainder of his Life, to promote the Service and Welfare of his Majesty and the Kingdom. His Majesty in his Answer to him, assured him, that he would acquit himself thoroughly of his Engagements to maintain the Rights, Privileges and Liberties of the Republick, and would neglect no Means for re-establishing Peace and Union in the Kingdom, and rendering the People happy, trusting that as Primate he would assist him with his Counsels to accomplish those good Ends. This Audience being over, he was conducted to an Audience of the Queen, and had afterwards the Honour to dine with their Majesties.

Hanover, July 31, N. S. M. Loo, who came hither lately on the Part of the Elector of Cologne, to compliment his Majesty on his Arrival in this Country, had on Tuesday last his Audience of Leave of the King, and is preparing to return home. M. Chavigny, Minister from the most Christian King, who came hither lately from England, set out from hence on Friday Morning last for the Court of Berlin.

Hague, Aug. 2, N. S. 'Tis advised from Vienna, that on the 18th of last Month Field-Marshal Count Konigsegg arrived there, and the same Day waited on the Emperor. M. d'Azevedo, Minister from the King of Portugal, arrived here the 27th past from London, and the same Day proceeded on his Journey for Hanover.

Admiralty Office, July 18, 1735:

His Majesty having been graciously pleased by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the better Government of the Charity for the Relief of poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice to all such Widows as aforesaid, whose Husbands died on or

since the 30th of August, 1732, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth, as also with the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford and Woolwich, and the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where they may be informed of all Particulars which entitle such Widows to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose: But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Thomas Corbett, Esq; at the Admiralty Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Court of Assistants for Management of the said Charity do hereby give Notice, that they will meet at the Admiralty Office on Tuesday the 9th of September, at Eight of the Clock in the Morning, to receive the Claims of such Widows, as shall be qualified according to the said Rules and Orders.

The Committee for Letting the Cities Lands in the Account of the Chamberlain of the City of London, give Notice, that they intend to Lett by Lease or Grant, the Liberty of Lighting the City of London, and Liberties thereof, with Globular Glass Lamps, according to the Pattern or Specimen in the Comptroller's Office in the Guildhall London, for Twenty One Years from Midsummer 1736; which said Lamps are to be light up every Night at the setting of the Sun, with Rape Oil, from the 10th of August to the 10th of April in every Year, and are to continue burning until One of the Clock in the Morning, and are to be set up at the Distance of Thirty Yards from each other, on each Side of the Street, even with the Posts of the Foot Passage in the great or High Streets, and in the smaller and lesser Streets not exceeding the Distance of Thirty five Yards, or as the Alderman, Deputy, and Common-Council-men of each Ward shall direct. And that the said Committee will sit in the Council Chamber of the Guildhall aforesaid; on the 30th Day of July Instant, at Four of the Clock in the Afternoon, to receive Proposals for the Purposes aforesaid; and in the mean time the Pattern or Specimen may be seen at the Comptroller's Office aforesaid.

The Committee for Letting the Cities Lands in the Account of the Chamberlain of the City of London, give Notice, That they intend to Lett by several Leases the following Lots, viz. No 1. The Building over the Weigh House in Eastcheap, now used as a Dissenting Meeting House. No 2. Five Messuages or Tenements, and an old Building adjoining to them, with a Shed and Piece of Garden Ground before the said Houses and Building, situate near the Foot Way leading from Old-street to Islington.
