Warfaw, July 20, N. S.

HE Primate of this Kingdom arriving here on the 15th Instant, had a folemn Audience of KingAugustus the next Day; when he made a Speech, in which having acknowledged his Majefty to be his lawful Sovereign, recom-mended the People to his Care and Favour, and wifhed him a long and happy Reign, he promifed to use most funcerely his best Endeavours, during the Remainder of his Life, to promote the Service and Welfare of his Majefty and the Kingdom. His Majefty in his Answer to him, affured him, that he would acquit himfelf thoroughly of his Engagements to maintain the Rights, Privileges and Liberties of the Republick, and would neglect no. Means for re-eftablifhing Peace and Union in the Kingdom, and rendring the People happy, truiting that as Primate he would affif him with his Counfels to accomplish those good Ends. This Audience being over, he was conducted to an Audience of the Queen, and had afterwards the Honour to dine with their Majesties.

Hanover, July 31, N. S. M. Loo, who came hither lately on the Part of the Elector of Cologne, to compliment his Majefty on his Arrival in this Country, had on Tuesday last his Audience of Leave of the King, and is preparing to return home. M. Chavigny, Minister from the most Christian King, who came hither lately from England, fet out from hence on Friday Morning laft for the Court of Berlin.

Hague, Aug. 2, N. S. 'Tis advifed from Vienna, that on the 18th of last Month Field-Marthal Count Konigfegg arrived there, and the fame Day waited on the Emperor. M. d'Azevedo, Minister from the King of Portugal, arrived here the 27th past from London, and the same Day proceeded on his Journey for Hanover.
