**W**E see here the Points specified in the Univerſalia iſſued by King Auguſtus, which are to be deliberated upon in the enſuing Dietines of the Kingdom, and are as follow: 1. The Safety of the Republick both at Home and Abroad. 2. The Re-eſta bliſhment of the antient Form of the Republick, both with Regard to Civil and Military Affairs, particularly with Regard to the free Courſe of Juſtice. 3. The Augmentation of the Troops of the Crown according as it ſhall be judged neceſſary. 4. The Support and Security of the King's Perſon, and of the Domeſtick Tranquility of the Kingdom; to the End that when that Tranquility ſhall be firmly ſettled, the Ruſſians and Saxons may depart the Kingdom. 5. The Means to recover the Regalia. 6. The neceſſary Meaſures to be taken for ſettling a proper Fund to make good the Deficiencies of the Royal Revenue. 7. The Means for putting the Artillery of the Crown, and every thing that relates to the Army, upon its antient Foot; as alſo to coin Money according to the antient Standard.

*Berlin, July 26, N. S.* The 19th Inſtant being fixed for his Pruſſian Maſtey's ſetting out on his Progreſs to Schwedt and Stettin, he accordingly left this Place at Nine a Clock that Morning. The only Perſon of Diſtinction who attended him is the Prince of Anhalt. General Borck, as Governor of Stettin, went thither ſome Days before, in order to receive his Maſtey. His Maſtey arrived at Schwedt in the Evening of the 19th, and ſtayed there till the 22d, when he proceeded to Stettin, where he was received that Night by General Borck. The next Day his Maſtey viewed the Fortifications of the Place. On the 24th the Troops there paſſed in Review before him. His Maſtey is expected back here this Evening. The Phylicians, who are ſtill anxious about his Maſtey's Health, have held of late ſeveral Conſultations upon that Subject, the Reſult of which has been tranſmitted to Dr. Boerhaave at Leyden for his Opinion and Advice.
