5. The Means to recover the Regalia.

6. The necessary Measures to be taken for settling a proper Fund to make good the Desiciencies of the Royal Revenue.

7. The Means for putting the Artillery of the Crown, and every thing that relates to the Army, upon its ancient Foot; as also to coin Money according to the antient Standard.

Berlin, July 26, N. S. The 19th Instant being fixed for his Prussian Majesty's setting out on his Progress to Schwedt and Stettin, he accordingly left this Place at Nine a Clock that Morning. The only Person of Distinction who attended him is the Prince of Anhalt. General Borck, as Governor of Stettin, went thither some Days before, in order to receive his Majesty. His Majesty arrived at Schwedt in the Evening of the 19th, and stayed there till the 22d, when he proceeded to Stettin, where he was received that Night by General Borck. The next Day his Majesty viewed the Fortisications of the Place. On the 24th the Troops there passed in Review before him. His Majesty is expected back here this Evening. The Phylicians, who are still anxious about his Majesty's Health, have held of late several Consultations upon that Subject, the Result of which has been transmitted to Dr. Boerhaave at Leyden for his Opinion and Advice.
