**A**T the Court at Kensington, the 30th Day of July, 1735.

**P R E S E N T,**

The Queen's most Excellent Majesty, Guardian of the Kingdom of Great Britain, and His Majesty's Lieutenant within the same, in Council.

Her Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to order, that the Parliament which stands prorogued to Thursday the 31st of this Instant, should be further prorogued to Tuesday the 14th Day of October next.

*Hanover, Aug. 2, N. S.* Letters from Vienna of the 23d past gave an Account in general, that a Courier who was dispatched from Constantinople the 6th of last Month, had brought the News of the Defeat of an Army of 80000 Turks by the Persians, in which 60000 Turks were killed or taken Prisoners. Of which Count Kinsky has since received the following Particulars. Thamas Kouli Kan appeared with a Body of about 15000 Men, the 10th of June, in the Plain called Arpa Ciary; upon which the Turkish Seraskier ordered a Body of chosen Horse to attack them; the Persians, after a small Skirmish, retired towards their Camp, which was placed at a certain Distance, on such disadvantageous Ground as might tempt the Enemy to attack it: The Turks advancing thither, the Persians shew'd as if they had not Courage to stand them, and so retreating further, they made towards Erivan. The Saraskier and his Bahaws being encouraged by this feigned Flight, marched after them with the whole Army, till they arrived at a Place where two other Bodies of Persian Troops were laid in Ambush: Here at once the Turks were saluted with a general Discharge of all the Persian Artillery on one Side, while those Bodies of Troops fell upon their Rear to cut off their Retreat; at the same time Thamas Kouli Kan seeing the Enemy brought into the Situation he intended, faced about with the rest of his Troops, and attacked the Turks with such Fury and Success, that he put them to an entire Rout. The Seraskier Kuperli having lost two Horses under him, was seen to fall to the Ground, and it is not known whether he is among the Slain or the Prisoners. Only three Bahaws with a small Number of Troops got away, all the rest (with the Artillery, Tents, Ammunition, and Provisions) were killed or taken by the Persians. On Friday last the Count de Schullenburg, a Colonel in the Imperial Service, being charged on the Part of the Empress to make her Imperial Majesty's Compliments to the King on his Arrival in these his Dominions, had his Audience of his Majesty. Commodore Matthews, who is come from England, and is going into the Service of the Czarina, was at the same time presented to the King, and had the Honour to kiss his Majesty's Hand; and on Sunday Morning last he set out for Lubbeck, in order to embark on board the Packet Boat, which is to sail from thence for Petersbourg.

*Hanover, Aug. 6, N. S.* Meff. de Kerfenbruck, Probst, and Hammerstein, who were deputed by the States of the Duchy of Osnabrug to make their Compliments to the King, had their Audience of his Majesty on Sunday last; and the Day following the Count de Seinsheim, Privy Counsellor of the Elector of Bavaria, his Aulick Counsellor, and Governour of the Electoral Prince, had likewise an Audience of the King. Yesterday in the Evening M. Azevedo, Minister from the King of Portugal, arrived here from England.

*His Majesty having been graciously pleased by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the better Government of the Charity for the Relief of poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice to all such Widows as aforesaid, whose Husbands died on or since the 30th of August, 1732, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth, as also with the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford and Woolwich, and the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where they may be informed of all Particulars which entitle such Widows to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose: But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Thomas Corbett, Esq; at the Admiralty Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Court of Assistants for Management of the said Charity do hereby give Notice, that they will meet at the Admiralty Office on Tuesday the 9th of September, at Eight of the Clock in the Morning, to receive the Claims of such Widows, as shall be qualified according to the said Rules and Orders.*

*The Committee for Letting the Cities Lands in the Account of the Chamberlain of the City of London, give Notice, that they intend to Lett by Lease or Grant the Liberty of Lighting the City of London and Liberties thereof, with Globular Glass Lamps, according to the Pattern or Specimen in the Comptroller's Office in the Guildhall, London, for Twenty One Years from Midsummer, 1736; which said Lamps are to be Light up every Night at the Setting of the Sun, with Rape Oil, from the 10th Day of August to the 10th Day of April in every Year, and are to continue burning until one of the Clock in the Morning, and are to be set up at the Distance of Thirty Yards from each other, on each Side of the Street, even with the Posts of the Foot Passage in the Great or High Streets, and in the smaller and lesser Streets not exceeding the Distance of Thirty five Yards, or as the Alderman, Deputy, and Common-Councilmen of each Ward shall direct. And that the said Committee will sit in the Council Chamber of the Guildhall*
