OUR last Advices from the Army of the Allies in Italy are of the 15th Instant, and import, that the Imperialists having made some Motions on the Left of the Head of the Lake of Garda, and reinforc'd those Troops which they had posted about Borghetto, and at Alla, the King of Sardinia and the Marshal de Noailles had judged it proper to order a considerable Number of Forces to Castiglion del Stivere and the Neighbouring Country, to oppose the Enterprizes the Imperialists might make on that Side. The Spaniards made slow Advances in the Siege of Mirandola.

Hague, Sept. 2, N. S. It is advised from Vienna the 20th of last Month, that it was certain the Elector of Bavaria had promised to send his Contingent to the Army on the Rhine,

and that a Treaty was on Foot for taking a Body of Bavarian Troops into the Emperour's Service. Letters from the Upper Rhine of the 27th of August relate, that Part of the Russian Troops were arrived near Heidelberg, where the Imperial Army commanded by Prince Eugene was expected from Bruschal: Prince George of Hesse Cassel was actually on the March towards Mentz with a Body of Troops he commands, and a Train of Artillery; and by all the Preparations made, it was believed Prince Eugene intended to pass the Rhine.
