ON the 26th past, the King was pleased to constitute and appoint M. de Lunebourg to be Gentleman of his Chamber, and M. de Verpup, Hasberg, Bulow, Loeven, Kiepan, and Busch, to be Gentlemen of the Court. Prince William of Hesse having taken Leave of the King on Tuesday Night last, his Highness set out Yesterday Morning early for Cassel, from whence he intends to take a Tour to the Army on the Rhine.

Paris, Sept. 3, N. S. Letters from Naples of the 5th of last Month give an Account, that Don Carlos's Council of War had ordered the greatest Part of the Spanish Troops that are in that Kingdom and in Sicily, to hold themselves in Readiness to march for Lombardy, it being thought sufficient to retain only such Detachments as seemed absolutely necessary to serve as the King's Guards, and to garrison the fortified Places of the two Kingdoms. Pursuant to which Resolution, Twenty Seven Tartans, under the Convoy of two Men of War, were actually sailed from Naples to take on Board the Troops appointed to be drawn from Sicily. The Imperial Garrison, which had defended Trapani, marched out of it the 27th of July with the Marks of Honour stipulated by the Capitulation: They embarked that Day on the Vessels provided to carry them to Trieste, which sailed the following Night. From Italy we have Letters of the 20th past, importing, that the King of Sardinia, who was to have gone to Turin to drink the Waters, according to the Advice of his Physicians, for his Health; had determined rather to go to take the Waters at a Country Seat in the Neighbourhood of Soncino, that he might keep near the Army.

at the Corner of the same Street, in the Hay-Market, was attempted to be burnt, by putting Rags and Paper under the Door, and setting them on Fire by a Train of Gunpowder, which burnt Part of the Floor and Shop Door: Her Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in the said Crimes, is pleased to promise her most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices in either of the said Crimes, so as they, or any of them, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a further Encouragement, the said John Kerr doth hereby promise a Reward of Ten Pounds to any Person or Persons, who shall discover the Person or Persons who sent the said Letters: And the said Nicholas Read doth also hereby promise a Reward of Twenty Pounds to any Person or Persons who shall discover the Person or Persons who attempted to burn his House: The said respective Sums to be paid by them upon the Conviction of the said Offenders, or any of them.
