Hanover, September 11, N. S.

ON the 3d Instant M. Diepenbroek, Grand Veneur to the Printe of Nassau Dillenbourg, was admitted to an Audience of the King, and delivered a Letter to his Majesty on the Part of his Highness. On the 5th M. d'Aylva, Master of the Horse to his most Serene Highness the Prince of Orange, arrived here, and was introduced to an Audience of the King the same Evening, when he delivered a Letter to his Majesty from his Highness. The same Evening the Marquess de la Forest, Grand Chamberlain to his Majesty, returned from Celle, whither he went on Saturday last to settle his private Affairs. The same Day the Prince of Anhalt Zerbst arrived here, and in the Evening paid his Respects to the King at Herenhaußen. On the 6th Instant at Noon M. de Imhoff, who has resided here for some Time in Quality of Minister from Brunswick, deliver'd to the King a Letter from the Dutchess Dowager of Wolfenbittel, notifying the Death of the late Duke her Consort, who died suddenly the 3d Instant; upon which Occasion this Court goes this Day into Mourning for a Fortnight; he had afterwards his Audience of Leave of his Majesty, and set out that Evening on his Return for Brunswick. On the 7th the King was pleased to promote the Landroft Steinberg to the Office of one of his Ministers of State, and named Six Counsellors of the Courts of Justice, viz. M. Bothmer, de Haacken, and de Hardenberg, for Hanover; and M. Sheiter, Laffert and Ebel, for Celle; and his Majesty was also pleased to constitute M. Finckstein Assessor at Stade, and M. Behren Assessor at Celle. M. Alt, Secretary from the King of Sweden, as Landgrave of Hesse Cassel, to the Court of Great Britain, took his Leave Yesterday of his Majesty at Herenhaußen, and set out this Morning from hence for Cassel.
