THE King has appointed the 22d, 23d, and 24th Infant, for reviewing two Regiments of Horse, commanded by Major General Schultz, and Colonel Walther; one Regiment of Dragoons, commanded by Major General Von Busch; and five Regiments of Foot, commanded by Lieutenant General Lucius, Brigadier d'Amproux, Brigadier Von Wrangel, Brigadier Von Rantfau, and Colonel Berwardt.

Hague, Sept. 16, N. S. Letters from the Spanish Camp before Mirandola of the First of this Month give an Account, that the Garrison of Mirandola having no Powder left for making a longer Defence, offered to capitulate the Day before; but the Count de Maceda, who commands the Spaniards, having signified to the Governour, that he and his Garrison must yield themselves Prisoners of War, they submitted to it, and the same Day the Spanish Grenadiers took Possession of the Place. The Imperialists continue in their Quarters in Tyrol, and in the Country at the Head of the Lake of Garda. The Duke de Montemar was making the necessary Preparations for besieging Mantua, but it will take up some Time before all can be ready. Advices from the Upper Rhine of the 10th Instant, left Prince Eugene still with his Army in the Camp near Heidelberg, and the other Bodies of the Imperialists continued in their former Quarters; the most considerable of those Bodies, in Number about 40000 Men, being encamped near Mentz, on this Side the Rhine. The main Body of the French, commanded by the Marshal de Coigny, having removed from their Camp at Winolsheim, where they had lain almost

three Months, had posted themselves on the rising Grounds extending from Ostoffen to Westoffen, with their Right at Ostoffen, and their Left towards Gundertheim, the Marshal having his Head Quarters at Bermertheim.
