Hanover, September 18, N. S.

ON the 10th Instant M. Groniau, Minister from the present Duke of Wolfenbittel, came hither, and brought Advice, that his most Serene Highness the Duke his Master arrived at Brunwick from the Army on the Rhine on Thursday the 8th. On the 11th the said Minister had his Audience of the King, and presented to his Majesty a Letter from the Duke his Master, notifying the Death of the late Duke his Father, and his Accession to that Dukedom. On the 14th the said Minister took his Audience of Leave of his Majesty, and set out the next Morning on his Return to Brunwick.

Paris, Sept. 17, N. S. Letters from Castiglion del Stivere of the 5th Instant advise, that on the 3d the Marshal de Noailles went to the King of Sardinia at Bardolano, to give him an Account of the Orders he had judged necessary to issue for the Troops of the Allies to advance to the Adige, and possess themselves of several Posts on that River. The Imperialists in Tyrol seeming by their Preparations and Motions to design to march back into Italy, as soon as Count Koniglegg shall return from Vienna, the King of Sardinia and the Marshal de Noailles had determined to be near at Hand to oppose that Design; accordingly most of the Troops of the Allies held themselves in Readiness to march, and those which were cantoned at the greatest Distance were to receive their Orders on the 6th; in the mean time the Marquess de Maillebois, with the Body he commands, marching actually on the 5th, was to reach Maringo

the next Day, and from thence was to advance with several Detachments that were to join him in his March to Gullolingo, while other Forces secured divers Posts which the Enemy might otherwise seize. The Armies on the Rhine have not yet put themselves in Motion on either Side for any Enterprize of Consequence:

And as a further Encouragement to such Discovery, the said Edward Boughton does hereby promise, That whoever shall discover the Person or Persons who sent or directed the sending of the said Letter, so as he or they may be convicted thereof, shall, upon such Conviction, receive as a Reward, over the Sum of Twenty Guineas; to be paid by Michael Tesmond, in Cross-street, near Hatton-Garden, London, or by Mr. Edward Boughton, at Cawston in Warwickshire.
