THE Letters from Italy of the 12th Instant give an Account, that the Marshal de Noailles, with the greatest Part of the Forces design'd to prevent the Return of the Imperialists into Italy from Tyrol, was advanced on the 10th to Zevio; that the Marquess de Maillebois, with another Body of Troops, had taken Possession of several advantageous Posts in the Country between the Adige and the Lake of Garda: And that the Imperialists, upon Intelligence that the Troops of the Allies were advancing towards them, ordered some Troops to canton on the Right of the several Posts they were possessed of at the Head of the Lake of Garda. Our last Advices from the Army commanded by the Marshal de Coigny on the Rhine are of the 16th Instant: The said Marshal had quitted the Camp of Bermesheim the 13th, and after a short March had caused the Army to encamp behind the little River Eise, and had taken his Head Quarters at Eppenheim. The Imperialists continued in their former Quarters.

Whereas two anonymous Letters were lately sent to Mr. John Kerr, in Norris-street in the Hay-market, requiring him to lay Ten Pounds in a certain Place; and as the Time therein mentioned; and threatening, in case of Noncompliance, to burn his House, and to kill the first Person who should come out of his said House: And whereas on Tuesday last, the 26th Instant, in the Night-time, the House of Mr. Nicholas Read, Haberdasher, at the Corner of the same Street, in the Hay-Market, was attempted to be burnt, by putting Rags and Paper under the Door, and setting them on Fire by a Train of Gunpowder, which burnt Part of the Floor and Shop Door: Her Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in the said Crimes, is pleased to promise her most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices in either of
