**O**N the 28th past M. d'Aylva, Master of the Horse to his most Serene Highness the Prince of Orange, had his Audience of Leave of the King, and the next Morning set out on his Return to Holland. On the 29th, the two Deputies from the Town of Hambourg, who were sent hither some Time ago to compliment his Majesty on his Arrival in this Country, had their Audience of Leave, and set out from hence in order to return to that City.

*Hague, Oct. 4, N. S.* The States of Holland are to assemble to Morrow, when the Great Pensionary, being in a pretty good State of Health, will be present among them. It is now said, that the Number of Imperialists designed to be sent to the Austrian Netherlands will be 50000, that Count Seckendorff is to command them, and it is thought they will take their March by the Country of Juliers. The Duke of Modena sets out from hence to Morrow for Calais, in order to pass over to England. It is advised from Loo, that the Princess Royal and the Prince of Orange will repair hither the Beginning of next Month, in order to reside here for some Time.
