ON Tuesday last the 7th Instant, the Parliament having met according to the Prorogation, his Grace the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, and being seated on the Throne with the usual Ceremony, his Grace sent for the Commons, and made a Speech to both Houses, who unanimously resolved upon humble and dutiful Addresses to his Majesty, which were this Day presented to his Grace.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

FROM the Experience of your former Behaviour, I make no Doubt, but you are met together with Hearts full of Duty, Affection and Loyalty to His Majesty, and zealously disposed to do what is necessary for the Safety, Honour and Happiness of this his Kingdom, which is all I have to recommend to you.

Since therefore, the Service of the King, and the Good of the Country, are the Ends we all aim at, I hope we shall agree in the Means of attaining them, and pursue them with that Temper and Wisdom, which Considerations of such Importance require.

The Improvement of the Linnen and Hempen Manufactures, will be always uppermost in the Thoughts of those who wish well to this Kingdom; and I can therefore never omit any Opportunity of recommending them to your particular Care and Attention.

Great Room still remains for enlarging these beneficial Branches of Trade; and the extending and spreading them over those Provinces where they have not yet prevailed, will be of the highest Advantage to your selves, and tend to remove all Occasions of Jealousy and Complaint with regard to the Woollen Manufacture.

These are Matters of the greatest Consequence to the Welfare of this Kingdom, and nothing will be a more acceptable Proof of the Wisdom and Prudence of your Deliberations, than the preparing such Laws as may increase your own Trade, and at the same Time prevent all illegal Incroachments upon that of Great Britain.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I have ordered the proper Officers to lay before you the several Accounts and Esti-

mates, which, I have reason to think, will meet with your Approbation, and am persuaded, you will most cheerfully and effectually raise the necessary Supplies to support his Majesty's Government with Honour, and provide for the National Debt.

If a Stop were put to that most pernicious Practice of the clandestine Running of Goods, I make no Doubt, but that the Publick Revenues would fully answer the Expence of the present Establishment.

Let it therefore be your Care to frame such Heads of a Bill, as may guard and secure the just Payment of the Duties you shall think proper to grant; and you may be assured they will be always applied to the Purposes for which they were intended.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I have taken all Occasions to represent to his Majesty the Circumstances of this Kingdom, and your Zeal for his Service; and his great Goodness in laying hold of every Opportunity to promote your Prosperity, leaves no Room to doubt the good Effects of such Representations.

You cannot but be sensible of the singular Happiness we enjoy, that whilst the greatest Part of Europe is oppressed with the Calamities of War, his Majesty's Royal Care and Counsels have hitherto preserved to his Subjects all the Benefits of Peace and Tranquillity. I am persuaded that this will not fail to excite in you the most grateful Acknowledgements of the Blessings of Peace, and at the same Time the utmost Readiness to take that Part upon all Occasions, which the Honour of his Majesty; and the Interest of this Country shall require.
