Whitehall, October 28.

ON Wednesday the 22d Instant, at One a-Clock in the Morning, his Majesty set out from Hanover. The next Day about Four in the Afternoon, the Princess Royal and the Prince of Orange met the King at Appledoren, whom his Majesty received most tenderly and affectionately, and after some Conversation with them, his Majesty proceeded on his Journey. Their Highnesses having given Orders for their Coach to be in Readiness, followed his Majesty and got late to Utrecht, where his Majesty lay. On the Friday Morning they came into his Majesty's Apartment, where he embraced them again most tenderly, took his Leave of them, and proceeded to Helvoetsluys, where he arrived about Four that Afternoon, and went immediately on board the Carolina Yacht; at Four the Yachts and Convoy sailed, but a thick Fog falling between Five and Six, they were obliged to come to an Anchor at a League's Distance from Helvoetsluys. About Eleven at Night the Fog cleared up, when they weighed Anchor, and on Saturday between Seven and Eight in the Evening, they came to an Anchor about three Leagues from Harwich, at which Place his Majesty landed on Sunday at Five in the Morning: and proceeding in an open Chaise, attended by the Marquis de la Forest, his Majesty's Grand Chamberlain at Ha-

nover, passed thro' the City of London, and arrived at Kenfington between Two and Three in the Afternoon, in perfect Health, God be praised. At the several Places through which his Majesty passed, the People expressed their Satisfaction at his safe Arrival, by all possible Demonstrations of Joy. That Evening there were Bonfires and Illuminations in the Cities of London and Westminster.

Kenfington, October 27.

This Day there was a very numerous Appearance at Court of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to pay their Compliments to his Majesty on his safe Return.

St. James's, October 28.

This Afternoon their Majesties and the Royal Family came hither from Kenfington.
