## A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

**W**HEREAS our Parliament stands prorogued to Tuesday the Eleventh Day of this Instant November, We, with the Advice of our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament shall be further prorogued, on the said Eleventh Day of November, to Thursday the Fifteenth Day of January next ensuing; and We have given Order to our Chancellor of Great Britain to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly: And We do hereby further declare our Royal Will and Pleasure, That the said Parliament shall, on the said Fifteenth Day of January next, be held and sit for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgeses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster, on the said Fifteenth Day of January next.

*Hague, Nov. 18, N. S.* Letters from the Rhine advise, that the Troops on both Sides were marching into Winter Quarters, pursuant to the Agreement for a Cessation of Hostilities. Twenty four Battalions and Twenty eight Squadrons, of the Imperialists commanded by Count Seckendorff, are coming to quarter in the Austrian Netherlands; Thirty nine Squadrons of Horse and Eleven of Hussars are to quarter in the Country of

Liege; and in the Countries of Cologne, Bergue and Juliers, Thirteen Battalions and Twenty four Squadrons are to be quartered. The States of the Province of Holland are still Sitting, and this Day came to a Resolution to raise some Millions for the Present publick Service by way of a Lottery and of Annuities for Life; the Scheme of which will shortly be published. Yesterday the States General passed a Resolution to allow for the future an annual Subsistence to their Sea Officers who are not actually employ'd, viz. 800 Guilders to a Captain, and a proportionable Pay to the inferior Officers; a Matter which has been sollicit'd a long Time. M. de Catwyck, who was lately preferred by the Prince of Orange to the Office of Drossard of Breda, died a few Days ago, for which Place there are several Candidates. The Prince, with his Consort the Princess Royal, are expected here To-morrow.

*Dublin, November 3.*

On the good News of His Majesty's safe Arrival in Great Britain, this Day the Flag was displayed at the Castle, the great Guns were fired at the Barracks, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison which were drawn out upon Oxmantown Green; and in the Evening there were Bonfires, Ringing of Bells, and other Demonstrations of Joy.

(in the Room of Christopher Montague, Esq; deceased, and of Roger Gale, Esq;) to be His Commissioners for the Management and Receipt of the Revenue of Excise and other Duties, within England, Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed.
